C.N.R. TO BRING WESTERN COAL

Ruined City of Santa Barbara Again Rocked By Quakes

THORNTON TO CARRY OUT PLANS

President of C. N. R. Announces Directors Have Reconsidered Recent Decision.

WOULD SPLIT COSTS

Experimental Shipment of 25,000 Tons of Alberta Coal To Be Made.

Ottawa, June 30.—Experimental shipments of 25,000 tons of Alberta coal to Ontario will be made in accordance with the original understanding. Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railway, stated in an interview here this morning.

Sir Henry explained that since the statement made some weeks ago to the effect that in view of the pending reorganization of freight rates the National railway would not be able to carry out the experiment, there had been a conference with officials of the Ontario government.

In this conference, which was held last Friday, it was shown that many persons in Ontario had in good faith committed themselves to the handling of the Alberta coal. Sir Henry stated that when he learned that matters had gone so far and the actual commitment had been made, he felt that the Canadian National railway should carry out its agreements.

During the last day of the session the house of commons voted \$25,000 to be used in the experiment. The initial cost of \$7 per ton is to be paid by the operators. If it should happen that the cost runs up to \$11 per ton, as estimated by the railways, the cost should be \$9 the Alberta government will also contribute one dollar per ton. Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, said in the house at the time that all arrangements were made for the shipment three weeks ago.

WOULD SIMPLIFY SYSTEM OF ISSUING PASSPORTS

TARA BUSINESS BLOCK BURNED

Pumper From Owen Sound Alone Saves the Village From Destruction.

Owen Sound, June 30.—The business section of the village of Tara, Bruce county, was damaged to the extent of \$40,000 or \$50,000 and for a time the entire village was threatened with destruction by a fire which broke out in one of the stores about midnight.

The buildings destroyed included the Queen's hotel, one of the finest small hostels in this section of the country; H. H. Rushton's shoe and grocery store, the Hill building, the Oddfellows and Foresters halls, and the residence of Miss Lizzie Byers. The Bank of Montreal building was on fire several times, but the flames were checked. All of the property on the west side of the main street from Matilda street to and including the Queen's hotel is a mass of smoldering ruins. But for the fact that the motor pumper from the Owen Sound fire department was rushed to Tara and pumped water for hours from the river to the burning buildings, the whole village would have been wiped out. Practically all of the burned property was owned by John Rudolph of the Queen's hotel and it is partially insured.

3 BRIDGES PASSED BY NEAR, REPORT COMING TONIGHT

No. 2 Committee Will Hear Findings of Engineer on City Structures.

NOTHING DRASTIC

Reports regarding the condition of York, King and Dundas street bridges will be provided for No. 2 committee of the city council at tonight's meeting. According to W. P. Near, city engineer, the condition of the King, Dundas and Wellington bridges is fairly good and there will be no drastic recommendations in his reports.

Police constables are continuing their patrol of Ridout street bridge. They have been checking traffic there for exactly a month now. Just how much longer this procedure will be followed cannot be ascertained but traffic is forced to crawl painfully across the ancient timbers, as a traffic officer "clocks" the snail's pace.

Hon. Lincoln Goldie Sees No Reason Why City Should Not Buy Land.

MATTER FOR TRUSTEES
Sir Adam Beck Accompanies Provincial Secretary in Tour Over Proposed Site.

Hon. Lincoln Goldie, provincial secretary, accompanied by Sir Adam Beck, paid a visit to the Ontario hospital this morning for the purpose of looking over the site at the west end of the hospital grounds which a special committee of the board of education is considering as a suitable site for the new East London collegiate, Trustee B. N. Campbell, chairman of the committee, accompanied by Trustee George F. Copeland, had a conference with the provincial secretary and Sir Adam at the Ontario hospital, following their inspection of the property, as a result of which the chairman has called a meeting of his committee for 2:30 this afternoon.

According to Mr. Copeland, Mr. Goldie seemed very favorably impressed with the proposition to allow the board to purchase three acres of the hospital property as a site for the new school.

Now Up To Board.

"To my mind it is now only necessary to convince the board of the desirability of this site," Mr. Copeland stated, "and it is likely that today's meeting of the committee will result in a recommendation to the board that this site be purchased and the new school erected there."

TOMORROW SEES NEW PER LAW

All Practitioners Notified of Thirty-a-Month Revision—Plan Foolproof.

CLEAR DATE DOUBTS

Still No Limit to Number of Six-Ounce Drug Store Prescriptions.

Limitations of liquor prescriptions to be issued by doctors throughout the province to thirty per month passed by the Ontario legislature at its last session, becomes effective tomorrow. This information is conveyed in an official notification sent to every practitioner in the province by the board of liquor commissioners for Ontario, and clears up all doubt as to just when the new amendment becomes law. Some doctors have expressed the thirty quota for May and June, while others kept below this figure under the impression that the amendment became valid with 4.4 beer on May 21 last.

Accompanying the information relative to the new prescription limit is a "per book" of new type for the month of July, there being thirty prescription blanks in the pad. In skeleton letters of large type "July 1925" is printed across each blank, thereby insuring the use of this blank in the proper month and as there are but thirty in the book the quota cannot be exceeded. Full information regarding the new law is inclosed at the request of the Ontario medical association.

Each month marked July specially marked prescription blanks will be forwarded each doctor, but the next book will contain ninety prescriptions thirty each for August, September and October. The month will be printed in large skeleton type over each form in color, aiding compliance with the law.

"Should a mistake be made" the letter says, "the possibility of this is hardly conceivable the thirty-first or subsequent dispensary prescription will be void. Hence no excess of liquor prescriptions will be a thing of the past, and friction cannot arise between the board and any physician over the excess of the statutory limitation. Supply of these books will be renewed quarterly."

St. David's Parishioners To Don Overalls and Wield Hammer and Saw on Hall

Men To Hold Carpentering Bee At Church Building in East London.

MAY FINISH ROOF

Extension Work Will Be Completed Soon At Cost of \$9,000.

St. David's Anglican church, East London, will be a busy place indeed tomorrow morning and afternoon when the members of the parish will hold a carpentering bee in connection with the building of the new parish hall.

It is the intention of the rector, Rev. R. D. Mess, M.M., and the members of the congregation to do practically all the work in the building of the hall, except perhaps the stuccoing.

The hall, which will be 65 feet by 30 feet, will adjoin the church proper, and will have an entrance from Hyla place. The present room of the church being used by the choir will be turned into a transept and thus considerably enlarged. Seating accommodation will be provided in the hall for about 350 people, while the seats of the church are being replaced and considerable redecoration done.

When completed the hall and renovations to the present church will have cost in the neighborhood of \$9,000. The parish has received a grant of \$2,000 from the diocese of Huron, has raised the sum of \$3,000 on a mortgage and the remainder by subscriptions.

TAKE EVIDENCE IN HOSPITAL ROOM

Important Witnesses in Wreck Probe Will Be Heard Tonight.

The adjourned inquest of last week into the street railway crash of Wednesday night, June 17, in which Inspector Charles Hoskins was killed and a score of others injured, when cars crashed at Riverview stop, will be continued and completed with the taking of additional evidence tonight. Two witnesses have yet to be heard.

Motorman Alden Paynter, driver of car No. 205, which crashed into the rear of 202, is still confined at Victoria hospital with his injuries. The jury will hear his evidence tonight in his bedroom at the hospital. Later at the police station the testimony of Robert Firth, who has also been confined to his home, 729 Central avenue, through injuries received in the accident, will be taken.

DEATH TOLL IN QUAKES NOW NINE

Santa Barbara Rocked by Three More Shocks This Morning.

TALES OF SURVIVORS

Loss in Property Values Will Exceed Thirty Millions.

Santa Barbara, Cal., June 30.—A violent earthquake shook this city at 1:22 o'clock this morning. This was the heaviest quake since the heavy tremor of yesterday morning.

A second severe shock again rocked the ruins at 4:39 o'clock.

Another tremor struck this city at 5:54 a.m. The third shock was not so severe as the two previous ones.

Santa Barbara, Cal., June 30.—A check-up this morning of the casualties and destruction resulting from the series of earthquakes which have laid waste a large portion of this city showed that nine persons lost their lives and thirty-five were seriously injured in the disaster. Conservative estimates of the material damage which cannot be definitely established until an architectural survey is completed today, fix the loss at \$15,000,000. Other estimates place it as high as \$30,000,000. The injured were treated at Cottage hospital, the only hospital remaining fit to receive patients. No check has been possible of those treated for injuries in their homes.

State street, the main artery of the town and a busy business district, presented a desolate appearance. Blocks of stone weighing 400 or 500 pounds each had crushed a small automobile, and in their fall ground out the life of William Proctor, a window cleaner, who had just driven to his early morning job when the first tremor came. Across the street stood a 5-ton truck crushed under a similar avalanche of stone, brick and mortar.

THREE CALLS UP AT PRESBYTERY

Two London Charges and One in St. Thomas To Be Dealt With.

The London Presbyterian presbytery will hold its first meeting since the consummation of union and the formation of the continuing Presbyterian church on Thursday morning next in New St. James' Presbyterian church, London.

Rev. James MacKay, D.D., who was chosen as moderator of the provisional presbytery about six weeks ago, and by whose direction the meeting has been called, will preside at the sessions, which will open at 10 a.m. Those on the full agenda of the meeting is not known it is quite probable that it will include consideration of the call extended last night to Rev. J. M. MacGillivray, Knox Presbyterian church, St. Thomas, by Chalmers Presbyterian church, Toronto, and the call extended to Rev. F. S. O'Neil, B.A., Leamington, former Methodist church minister, by Chalmers Presbyterian church, London.

There has been absolutely no change made in the boundaries of the presbytery as compared with those under the former regime, and the same applies to the synods, inasmuch as they concern the province of Ontario. The Presbyterian synod for Western Ontario thus remains as the synod of Hamilton and London, and for Eastern Ontario the synod of Toronto and Kingston.

Rev. J. J. Paterson, D.D., St. Andrew's church, Sarnia, who was chosen as moderator of the provisional continuing Presbyterian synod of Hamilton and London, will call a meeting of that court very probably some time later on in the fall. Rev. J. J. Paterson, D.D., London, ex-clerk of the former Presbyterian presbytery, is clerk of the new presbytery, while Rev. Austin L. Budge, M.A., Hamilton, is the clerk of the continuing Presbyterian synod of Hamilton and London.

HAMILTON CORONER WILL PROBE TRIPLE MURDER

Hamilton, June 29.—Coroner McIlwraith will start an inquest next Monday night into circumstances of the triple murder in the foreign quarter. The police admit the crime has no nearer solution now than the morning it was discovered. It is expected that the inquest will bring out considerable information regarding illicit liquor traffic in this city.
