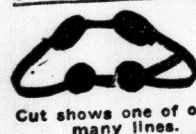

BIG MOB STONES O. T. A. OFFICERS

Five Hundred Attack Pro-
vincial Police With Guns
and Rocks.

RESERVES CALLED

Canadian Press Despatch.
Hamilton, Sept. 22.—Police reserves
were called out last night when a
mob of 500 threatened Ontario tem-
perance enforcement officers, who
were raiding a north-end house.
Guns were fired and rocks thrown at
Inspector Tabor and Provincial Of-
ficers Hefferon and Gorman.

According to the officers' story, they
had entered a house which had been
under observation for weeks and ar-
rived in time to see two young girls
concealing bottles of liquor. While
they were questioning the occupants,
500 people assembled outside and the
three were bombarded with stones
while guns were discharged. None of
the officers were injured.

Hefferon, a former South African
Olympic star runner, chased one gun-
man for several blocks, finally run-
ning him down. Criminal charges are
expected to be laid today.

LABOR LEADER GUILTY
ON BLACKMAIL COUNT

John J. McNamara, U. S.
Troublesome Radical, in
Trouble Again.

Indianapolis, Sept. 22.—John J.
McNamara, a stormy labor leader of
Indiana, was found guilty of black-
mail by a jury in criminal court to-
day. McNamara, who served a
prison sentence in California for par-
ticipation in the Los Angeles Times
dynamiting of fourteen years ago,
was accused of interfering with
workmen on the Elks club building
here in 1922.

The state contended he intimidated
workers to force them away from the
job so that other workers could ob-
tain employment.

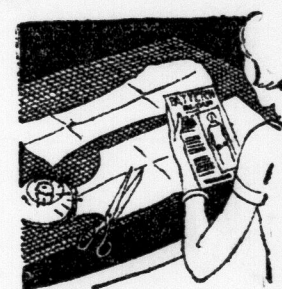

CHINESE OPPOSE SHANGHAI INQUIRY

Say That Chinese, Not British,
Report Should Be
Accepted.

Associated Press Despatch.
Peking, Sept. 22.—The Chinese gov-
ernment, replying today to a British
note of September 1, opposes a judi-
cial inquiry into the Shanghai affair
of May 20, and charges that the Brit-
ish proposal for such an inquiry has
delayed settlement of the incident.
Several Chinese were shot by police
of the international settlement of
Shanghai on May 20, during a demon-
stration in favor of striking employ-
ees of Japanese cotton mills.
The Chinese government's note, de-
livered to the British legation today,
expresses the opinion that since the
facts of the Shanghai affair already
