SIGHT SAVING CLASS FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Institute For Blind Ready To Care For Eyes of School Children.

School Inspector V. K. Greer included the following letter in his last report to the board of education from the Canadian Institute for the Blind: "With reference to sight-saving class survey in your city, I would say that, subject to later ratification, our board will endeavor to place itself in position to make a survey of the children of school age in your city who are eligible for sight-saving class provision, during the coming fall at our own expense for salary of workers. This work obviously cannot be undertaken until classes reopen next session and at that time details of arrangements, including disposition of records made, as well as the obligation of your board concerning activity to be undertaken as a result of our findings and recommendations, can all be gone into and agreed upon before the survey is inaugurated."

The board has realized for some time the pressing need for what are known as sight-saving classes amongst children whose vision is below par and some time ago asked the co-operation of the institute in arranging this work. The board will consider the proposal offered and in all probability avail themselves of the help suggested.
