## DANGEROUS STATE OF CHINA AFFAIRS

Fear for Safety of Leader of the Revolution.

Shanghai, Aug. 18.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the ex-provisional president of China, disregarding the warning of friends who fear for his safety since the execution of several Hainan generals, left Shanghai to-day for Peking. General Huang Siao, who commanded the Southern Republican army in the revolution, which overthrew the Imperial government, and who was to have accompanied Dr. Sun, has abandoned the journey. The southern generals recently put to death were members of Dr. Sun Yat Sen's party, the Tung men Hui, and were seized at the capital by direction of President Yuan Shi Kai, on the charge of being implicated in an alleged conspiracy against the Peking government. Two of the officers were tried by drumhead court martial at the capital and shot. The others were returned in chains to Hankow and there executed.

## GO-OPERATIVE FARMS FOR ENGLISH WOMEN

The First One Will Comprise a Tract of 223 Acres in the County of Sussex.

London, Aug. 19.—The first English co-operative farm for women is to be located on a tract of 223 acres in Sussex, on the south coast.

According to American Consul Griffiths, who is sending a report on it to Washington, the breeding and care of horses, cows, sheep, pigs, poultry and rabbits, cultivation of fruit, vegetables and flowers and raising of ordinary farm crops will be undertaken.

The co-operative farm movement has two aims. One is to provide young women who are desirous of emigrating to any of the English overseas possessions with thorough training in all branches of farming and also an adequate knowledge of domestic economy. The other aim is to furnish congenial employment in the United Kingdom to members of that increasing body of women who desire to cultivate the land but lack the experience and the facilities for doing so.

## INSANE ACT OF BRITISH OFFICER

Killed His Daughters, Wounded His Wife and Committed Suicide.

Eastbourne, Eng., Aug. 19.—Hicks Murray, an officer attached to the Gordon Highlanders and who had seen much Indian service, last night shot and killed his two young daughters, severely wounding his wife, and then committed suicide with the same weapon. He is thought to have become suddenly insane. After the crime had been committed the house in which Capt. Murray resided was mysteriously burned to the ground. His wife has succeeded in escaping, but five bodies were found in the ruins, and of these two have not been identified.

Mrs. Murray was later found wandering about the streets in her night dress, screaming for her children. Capt. Murray left a letter in which he said: "I am hopelessly ruined and have for this reason killed all those dependent on me. I should like all of us to be buried in one grave. God forgive me."

## PULP MILL PLANS ABOUT COMPLETED

Promoters and Owners of Water Rights said to have Agreed—Extending Bathurst Electric Light Service.

Bathurst, N. B., Aug. 19.—The returning officer for the new town elections having been named there is now a good deal of talk about the majority contest. Several names have been mentioned, but so far no serious canvassing has been done. A certain number of ratepayers, desiring to run things to suit themselves, formed a ticket of mayor and aldermen, but this move met with so little encouragement that it soon was abandoned. No "hole and corner" politics in municipal affairs is the cry. Give us good sound business men.

Another move has been made in the direction of opening up the pulp industry here. Those interested in the water rights on Nepisiguit River met the promoters of the prospect pulp mill here last week and it was given out that arrangements satisfactory to both parties were made.

The Bathurst Electric Light and Water Power Company, of which J. P. Leger is the president and manager, is pushing forward with success the construction of their large concrete dam, situated at Tetagouche Falls. A large number of men are employed and it is expected to have the work completed in five weeks from date. Your correspondent is informed that this work will cost \$25,000.

Mr. Leger is a firm believer in the future of Bathurst and is not afraid to invest his money. He is therefore building not only to meet the present requirements but on a scale sufficiently large to meet the growing needs of our town.

The new line which he is now building from the falls to connect with the line at the site of the old wooden dam runs through a populous and prosperous farming community and the farmers are preparing to install in their barns and homes an up-to-date electric lighting system, which will largely increase the number of lights now furnished by the company. The energy and pluck shown by Mr. Leger deserve every success.

## STUFFED BALOT BOX TO OBLIGE FRIENDS

Suffragist Surprised She Could Not Cast Votes For Them at School Meeting.

Under Connecticut laws, women may vote upon school matters when properly qualified, and so, at a meeting held at Stratford, Conn., to consider an addition to the Washington school, about thirty women appeared to vote. They were headed by Mrs. Rosamond Winton, leader of the Stratford suffragettes and prominent in local clubs.

Mrs. Winton favored an appropriation for the school addition, which was later defeated, and after her speech, balloting began. When the tellers began their work they notified Judge Charles H. Peck, who was presiding, that some-very had dropped in three ballots, folded together. Judge Peck, who is a church member and fighting foe of demon rum, ordered a second ballot.

Again the tellers found that someone had stuffed in three ballots at one whack and again there was an uproar. When something akin to order was restored, Mrs. Winton smilingly informed the meeting that she had put in three ballots each time, because two dear lady friends of hers had been unable to come and she was acting as their proxy. Her indignation was noticeable when a new ballot was ordered and it was ruled that she could cast only one vote.

## GREAT BRITAIN AND PANAMA EXPOSITION

London, Aug. 19.—The United States embassy today received a reply from the British Foreign office to President Taft's invitation to the British government to participate in the Panama Pacific exposition. The Foreign office was disposed to accept the invitation on principle, but its final decision in the matter will be influenced partly by the possibility of arriving at a satisfactory settlement with the exposition authorities in regard to the accommodation to be provided for British exhibitors. No hint is given in the reply in respect to other possible influences which may affect the British decision, but it is evident that a loophole has been left for British refusal of the invitation on account of possible unfavorable canal legislation.

## SAD PLIGHT OF TRACADIE WOMAN

Destitute in Montreal After Fruitless Search for Her Husband

HER CHILD ILL

Montreal, Aug. 19.—Absolutely destitute, with a feeble little boy clinging to her shoulder Mrs. Michael Sullivan, of Tracadie, N. B., was the subject of much sympathy at Windsor street station today.

Mrs. Sullivan and her baby, who is so ill that she fears he will die before reaching home, arrived from New York last night where she has for the past month searched for her husband who left home three years ago but had written promising to meet her on her arrival there. During the first year after the father had left she received occasional remittances from him, but for the past two years she has been unable to save enough to take herself and the boy to the father who wrote occasionally saying he could send no money as he was finding it hard to prepare a home for them if they would come to him.

With a hundred dollars put by Mrs. Sullivan left Tracadie about a month ago for New York, writing to tell her husband that she was coming. He failed to meet her at the station and she was unable to find him, although she followed every clue for a month. Finally with no money left she applied to one of the railroads which granted her transportation to Montreal and wired an uncle concerning her plight. The uncle has promised to meet her here and take her home and is expected tomorrow morning.

Passengers at the station hearing her story, collected enough money to secure her board and lodgings for the night and to pay for a visit to a doctor.
