**PROHIBITION AND INLAND
REVENUE CONVICTIONS**
At Dalhousie last week Excise Officer Stewart, working in conjunction with Inspectors Smith and Doyle of Campbellton, obtained four convictions under the Inland Revenue Act, for manufacturing spirits and home brew. Those convicted were Wm. Harquail, fined \$50.00; Arthur Charbonnet, \$50.00; Theo. Madson, \$50.00; and Joseph Pirolet, \$50.00. Last week Officer Stewart with Inspectors Quinterman and Manderson made a seizure of home brew and part of a still in Newcastle. This will likely result in the conviction of Philip Le Galley and Annie Maloney who were the owners of the "beehive mill." The inspectors also had three prohibition seizures in Newcastle last week.
On Tuesday Inspectors Smith and Kane obtained a conviction against Joseph Winchester of Dalhousie for illegal selling. The penalty was \$50.00 and costs or three months in jail. Winchester chose the latter.

**PROPERTY OWNERS
WILL VOTE**
Town Bill for Authority to Issue Bonds for Improvements Amended.
Last week a delegation of Campbellton citizens met the Municipal Committee of the Local Legislature and discussed the Town of Campbellton bill to authorize the issuing of \$25,000 bonds for certain water and sewerage extensions. The bill was amended to provide for the payment of capital expenditures as represented in the overdraft.
The delegation while favoring some of the work planned, thought the time not ripe for the whole program, but expressed themselves willing to abide by the decision of the property owners on a referendum.
The request was favored by the committee and we understand the bill has been recommended with the amendment asked for.
This means that if the property owners are favorable the work as planned will be carried out.
No doubt the Town Council will call upon the citizens at an early date.

**DEATH SENTENCE
FOR BETRAYER**
M. Jeannes Declared Guilty of Betraying Nurse Edith Cavell.
Brussels, April 5.—M. Jeannes, betrayer of Edith Cavell, British war nurse, was Tuesday found guilty and sentenced to death.
Miss Cavell was executed by the Germans during their occupation of Belgium on the ground that she was a spy and revealed secrets to the Allies.
