WON'T PLEAD TO THE U.S.

House Fully Concur in Hon. Mr. Fisher's Decision re. St. Louis.

Minister of Agriculture Relates the Way in Which St. Louis Loses Big Features in Our Live Stock and Cheese Exhibits—Government Will Exercise Any Friendly Act Within Its Power re. the Strike at Sydney.

Ottawa, June 3.—During the consideration of the estimates of the Department of Agriculture in the House last night Minister Fisher communicated information to the House relating to the Dominion exhibit at St. Louis. What live stock exhibit there is will be due to the enterprise of individuals. Mr. Fisher said the department was unable to do anything with the Washington authorities in the way of securing a modification of the regulations. Secretary Wilson curtly intimating that the United States will run its affairs as its people liked, and they did not want to import live stock from Canada or any other country.

By way of encouraging individuals who desire to exhibit at St. Louis, the Government will double the amount of any prizes which they may receive.

There Will Be No Cheese Exhibit. Mr. Fisher explained that there would be no cheese exhibit at St. Louis. A creditable exhibit would cost from \$12,000 to \$15,000 for refrigerators, etc. Representatives of the dairy interest had been consulted and it was decided that the advantages to be gained from an exhibit would not warrant the outlay.

The exhibition of live stock at St. Louis will also be very small. Mr. Fisher said a delegation had waited on him and had asked for \$120,000 for an exhibit. The Live Stock Association had decided that it would not be advisable to exhibit. Mr. Fisher said he did not care to spend more, in which decision the House fully concurred. There will be an exhibition of sheep, swine, horses and cattle by individuals.

Seeking a Motive. The motive which prompted the St. Louis Exhibition authorities to assume a hostile attitude towards Canadian live stock came in for discussion. Mr. Fisher said the department was endeavoring to find out what registers and pedigrees were worthy of recognition, for the purpose of free entry of breeding animals, some animals coming in, he said, would not be recognized by breeders. The question was receiving the consideration of the Live Stock Commissioner. Under existing conditions, some animals are admitted for breeding purposes, which are on-grade animals, and not worthy of being registered.

Tobacco Customs. Mr. Clancy was informed that \$1,249,569 customs duties were collected on raw leaf tobacco for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904.

The bill amending the act providing for the payment of bounties on lead contained in lead bearing ore mines in Canada was given a third reading. Sir Richard Cartwright stated that \$51,000, or 60 per cent. of the claim allowed, had already been paid on bounties.

The Strike at Sydney.

R. L. Borden called the attention of the Government to the strike of the employees of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company at Sydney. Mr. Fielding replied that the Government fully realized the gravity of the situation. He assured the House that the Government would exercise any friendly office within its power.

Mr. Prefontaine moved the second reading of the bill to amend the pilotage act. In reply to Mr. Casgrain's criticisms, Mr. Prefontaine replied that he was simply trying to improve the safety of navigation.

During the discussion of the bill providing for the making of regulation for the inspection of naphtha and similar launches, Mr. Clancy drew the attention of the Government to the report that many inspecting engineers were of the opinion that naphtha launches should not be permitted to carry passengers at all.

At his suggestion the bill was held over to give the Minister of Marine an opportunity to look into the matter of the refusal of the inspectors to carry out the law in regard to the inspection of the larger class of naphtha launches engaged in the public service.

Belief to Policy Holders.

Ottawa, June 3.—Senator Kerr of Toronto moved the second reading of his bill to amend the Insurance Act in the Upper House yesterday. He explained the insurance companies had been empowered to do assessment business in Canada. One company had done a very large assessment business in Canada, which was now decreasing, matters thus becoming worse and worse for those holding the policies. As a consequence of the increased assessments, there was a reduction of the insured to a class who either were too old or were debilitated from obtaining insurance elsewhere. The present bill was to relieve these. The bill, after some discussion, was read a second time.

Just About Salary.

Ottawa, June 3.—At the Agricultural Committee yesterday, Joseph L. Haycock, Dominion binder twine inspector, was examined. He said that last year about \$1,000 was collected in fines for the infraction of the law. The consumption of twine in Canada last year was 14,000 tons of which 6,500 were made in Canada.

Treaty of Arbitration.

Lisbon, June 3.—A treaty of arbitration has been signed between Spain and Portugal. It conforms with article 10 of The Hague convention.
