debts amounting to from seven to eight hundred thousand dollars with English creditors.

In America the Duke of Kent introduced Court social standards as the house of Hanover knew them, and at Quebec and at Halifax his equipment his residence and his whole social life and surrounding was as lavishly spread as it in one of the petty German states.

But all England did not approve of such gross laxness, socially and morally; and it seems to have remained for our English naval officer, Capt. John Crosskill, to play the part of John the Baptist in reproving Royalty for its waywardness in the new and plastic society of Halifax. Captain Crosskill knowing that H. R. H. household was presided over by Madame Saint Laurent, forbade Mrs. Crosskill attending social functions at the Royal residence or calling on this mistress of the Princes' Lodge.

The Duke learning of this officer's criticisms, rebuked him for his temerity in true German fashion and phasology and warned him if it did not cease he would take his commission from him. Our courageous captain as promptly replied that His Majesty should have his commission at once, as he would not act longer in his service or be intimidated, and he at once handed to His Royal Highness his resignation and left the service and very soon thereafter came to Granville, Annapolis County, where society was free of such blights and where the atmosphere was socially pure with its New England puritanical standards and where the ideals of the Hanoverian princes of Germany that were brought to England by George the 1st were not tolerated if indeed known by that generation.

How was it that Captain Crosskill happened to come to this part of the Province? As stated in a previous paper the lands reaching from Mr. Thies' place in the west to the Baptist Church in the east was owned by Peter Pineo between 1785 and 1790 and were mortgaged to John Phillips of Halifax. Peter Pineo was lost at sea on a voyage to West India and the mortgage foreclosed and the place bought in by Phillips.

Capt. Crosskill was married to Phillis daughter and through the death of the father-in-law in 1792 and his wife in 1794, Granville property seems to have been given to the Crosskill heirs. In 1800 the Crosskill family were living in Halifax and it is not clear just when the captain moved here for acres that came into his possession. Shortly after 1800 his wife, Charlotte, died, and it would seem that his children continued in Halifax for some years after this date, although the father was probably here on his property.

Mr. Colneek, writing thirty years ago, states that Capt. Crosskill built a vessel here, the first one launched from this part of the river, she being called the "Robert Burns". Between 1800 and 1815 he built a shop on the west side of the Creek that extended up Queen Street to near where Mrs. Fisher's tailor shop now stands, this was the first and for many years the only place of business in the vicinity. It was a general store, with hardware, dry goods, rum and molasses, etc., and its location near the water front made it a busy centre during the months when the river was open for navigation.

Capt. Crosskill also erected the first house on the hill side where E. R. Orlando now lives and from here in December, 1813, his only daughter, Ann Petty, was married to Thomas James, by Rev. John Milledge, Rector of Granville.

Mr. James at this time held an important position in the commissary department of the army at Halifax but a few years later came here to reside and was given the fine property on the hillside by his generous father-in-law. About the same time Capt. Crosskill was married a second time, his wife being Frances Gidney Morrison, widow of Capt. Angus Morrison and daughter of the old Loyalist, Joseph Gidney, of this locality.

The second wife had many real estate holdings of her own in this county and in Digby also, and was a woman of much business ability. Capt. Crosskill gave her a building lot at the head of Queen Street where the old hotel property now stands, to be exclusively her own and here she built a comfortable residence and

they lived happily there until the captain's death in April, 1823. The second wife survived him until 1841, making her home in Belleisle and in Sandy Cove after his death.

Capt. Crosskill was buried in the field back of the Annapolis Valley Cider Manufacturing plant on a small hill side. In 1826 there was a large orchard of ten to fifteen acres in that part of his farm and it was at the west border of this orchard that the burial lot was placed. At that time practically the whole town site, other than this, was in bushes and alder swamps or forest, but in the course of 100 years the rest of the town site has been cleared and used for building purposes, while this small area, used for this early burial lot has been neglected,—being now, no mans land and has become a jungle of briars and wild wood so that graves, stones and enclosures are hidden. Such seems to be the fate of private burial lots every where, as property is transferred, strangers come to occupy the homes of former residents and too often desecrate and obliterate the mounds containing the dust of former generations.

THE GOLD BUG

Buried treasure is said to be hidden away on Oak Island in Mahone Bay. Legend says the treasure is \$50,000,000 worth of Spanish doubloons, pieces of eight, old-fashioned English crowns and bullion. Now, a party of searchers, said to be financed by a Chicago company, are on the island. Earlier legends connected with the search for this "treasure" are said to have inspired Edgar Allan Poe's famous story "The Gold Bug". Probably a dozen companies have been formed to recover this legendary treasure, and about a million dollars have been collected from credulous folk in New England and Nova Scotia, eager for the thrills of treasure seeking by proxy. The promoters of these companies did very well, but the shareholders never received dividends. One company, which worked on the theory that the famous Captain Kidd had buried on Oak Island the treasure he was supposed to have captured in the East Indies, purchased the dunnage of a ship from the East Indies and distributed it out on the shores of the island before they started operations and took the public into their confidence.

An instrument has been devised at the Oregon Experiment Station to indicate just when pears have reached the right stage of maturity for eating, canning or shipping. It consists of an apparatus which measures the pressure required to punch shallow holes one-half inch in diameter in the flesh of a pear. Bartlett pears requiring 35 pounds pressure to make the perforations are ready for picking and for long-distance transportation.
