For all these reasons, if all the branches which have not as yet ans swered to my appeal would do so forthwith they would do thereby an act of christian charity for which they would not fail to be recompensed a hundredfold. There are over 2011 branches which have not voted anything. I therefore humbly claim your influence to help me to reach that end.
