that we are talking about, but we are talking about a fundamental issue that affects all of us in this House of Commons.

If the GST goes through and Canadians do not like it, they can vote this government out.

Some hon. members: They will.

Mr. Wilson (Etobicoke Centre): But, if the tactics of Senator MacEachen and the other Liberal senators are followed and they win the day, what can Canadians do with Mr. MacEachen? Nothing. They have no recourse. They have no way of expressing their point of view on what the position of the Senate should be because they are unelected.

That is the fundamental principle, and the questions that the Liberal Party is trying to pose there will not and cannot deflect from that fundamental principle.

CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

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Ms. Joy Langan (Mission—Coquitlam): Mr. Speaker, this past weekend the Prime Minister, during his speech at the children's summit, said: "And to the children, I invite you to listen carefully to what we say and in the coming years to hold us to our commitments. I hope none of us will be found wanting".

Would the Deputy Prime Minister tell us and the one in six children in Canada living in poverty just what this government's agenda or timetable is to meet and comply with the UN Convention on Children's Rights?

Hon. Perrin Beatty (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, I am delighted to have the opportunity to respond to this question. The summit, which was held under the leadership of the Prime Minister of Canada this weekend, was the most successful summit of its kind in the history of the world.

Some hon. members: Hear, hear.

Mr. Beatty: We are taking action as of now. I am pleased to be able to inform the House of Commons that consistent with recommendation No. 1 of Mr. Rix Rogers' report, the Prime Minister today asked me to co-ordinate activities within the government relating to children in response to the declaration on behalf of children at the United Nations. Second, and in response to recommendation No. 2 of Mr. Rix Rogers, I am announcing today the creation of a children's bureau within Health and Welfare Canada to assist us in doing that.

We are committed to full ratification of the convention. We will have that done before the end of next year. Our goal is to ensure that all legislation in Canada complies with the convention itself, which will enter into Canadian law.
