PEACE DELEGATES STILL DEADLOCKED

First Stage of Negotiations Ends Without Much Apparent Progress, and Now Powers Take a Hand.

TURKEY MUST GIVE IN Refusal to Make Concessions Cannot Be Long Maintained—Suspension of Negotiations Not Ominous.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—(Can. Press.)—The first stage of the peace negotiations, which is regarded by diplomats largely as one of pretence on Turkey's part to avoid the appearance of yielding to the demands of the allies without pressure from the powers, is over now.

Without money, her army inadequate and demoralized, her attendance on the frontiers is in no condition to resume hostilities with the slightest chance of success.

At today's sitting of the conference Turkey renounced in favor of the allies her rights in the island of Crete, and promised further rectification of the Thracian frontier, but insisted upon the retention of Adrianople, which was declared that this was not satisfactory, and suspended the conference.

Not Broken Off. That does not mean a rupture of the negotiations. The conference may be resumed either by Turkey giving notice that she has fresh proposals to make to the allies, on the ground that they have communications to make to the Turks. It is generally expected that the work of the conference will be taken up again at the end of the week, when the festivities in connection with the Orthodox Christmas are ended.

The allies today held a short meeting before the official sitting and discussing three possibilities with reference to the statement which reached Pasha had been asked to make respecting the Balkan ultimatum and agreed on the terms of the allies. First, if Rehad Pasha's statement was arrogant and provocative, then notwithstanding the advice of the powers in favor of negotiation, they would break off the conference; second, if Rehad Pasha were courteous, but the new concessions unimportant, they would suspend the conference; third, if Rehad Pasha made important concessions, without

absolutely conceding the allies' demands, they would adjourn the sitting for a week, and then consult their respective governments.

Expectation was intense when the Serbian delegate, Stojan Novakovich, opened the session by reading a long and brief speech. He said that Turkey was prepared to give further proof of her sincerity and desire to avert bloodshed, but he regretted that the allies seemed determined to concede nothing on their part and had turned their ear to humanitarian considerations.

Allies Are Irritated. The Balkan plenipotentiaries could not discuss the discontinuity of the new statement in which Rehad Pasha, also containing small concessions, was made, and the session was unchanged. Various delegates asked Rehad Pasha if he could not add something, even unofficially, to the statement which he had just made.

The sitting was then suspended in order to give time to the allies to formulate their answer. The Balkan plenipotentiaries met in an adjoining room, where, after a short discussion, they decided that the Turkish statement corresponded with the second alternative contemplated in the decision taken at the meeting held prior to the official sitting. An answer was drafted accordingly, and the sitting was resumed.

BANK NOTE OF TWO DENOMINATIONS

Cashier in Western Hotel Discovers, After Much Trouble, Bank Printer's Inadvertence.

In spite of the vigilance of the inspectors of the bureau of engraving and printing, an imperfect or misprinted bank note will sometimes get into circulation, the most extraordinary thing of the sort being a fifty-dollar note which was discovered in a western hotel in making up his accounts found a discrepancy that could not be explained, and he called upon the cashier for assistance.

The cashier had no better success. Again and again he counted the bills with the same result—one time the cash would balance, and the next time it would show a shortage. Finally, he examined each bill, both face and back, and upon the mystery was explained. One of the bills bore the design of fifty dollars on the face and that of one hundred dollars on the back. The clerk had taken the bill for \$100.

Upon corresponding with the treasury department, they found that the department had a record of the design in 1890 one sheet of bank notes for a national bank in Kansas City had been reversed in the press, and the obverse of a fifty-dollar bill at the top and the reverse of a one hundred dollar bill at the bottom. The other side of the bill was a one hundred dollar bill, and the reverse of a one hundred dollar bill.
