Trade Exceeds Billion.

Turning to trade figures, the minister said the total trade of Canada for the year ended March 31, 1912, amounted to \$874,637,794; for the fiscal year ended March 31, 1913; the total trade exceeded \$1,000,000,000. The imports

for the year amounted to \$691,000,000. and the exports to \$393,000,000, making a total of \$1,085,000,000. The balance of trade in favor of the United States was very large. The trade doubled within six years. Our imports from the United States have risen from \$208,-000.000 in 1907-08 to \$435,000,000 in


