HOCKEY SITUATION NICELY MUDDLED

T. R. & A. A. Now Decide to Play Senior—Pros Have First Workout—Gossip.

The hockey situation gets more muddled every day. With St. Michaels declaring themselves in senior hockey again it has stirred the hockey enthusiasts into the greatest excitement since the amalgamation of the two local clubs was announced Wednesday night. The amalgamation was declared void on Thursday morning, and in the afternoon a team that had dropped out of the senior series had their O.H.A. fees and declared themselves in again. A wild scramble for the players resulted, and it ended up last night with Hefferman, Gordon and Harry McKinnon and Stevenson turning out as T.R. & A.A. and declaring that they will play a team. Mack Dooh was approached, but declared himself solid for the Argonauts, and there he will stay. Just where it will end is hard to see.

While all this was going on the other clubs stood pat. St. Michaels lined up four of last year's team for their initial workout. Moody of last year's Varsity senior O.H.A. team was out with the Saints, and several new men will be out within the course of a few days. Dan Addison is out of town, but will be back in time to play for the Irish. Jimmy Elanette, Jerry Laframme, Dutch Richardson and Jack McCamus were the players of last year's good team to turn out last night.

The pros have no trouble in their ranks and Jack Marshall had his Torontoes out for their first work in the morning. They showed exceptional work for the first time out and will have a good team again. Harry Holmes and Claude Wilson, the two seniors, handled up on the job. The defense is the same as last year, Marshall and Harry Cameron. Carpenter, a good looking boy from Port Arthur, will be a handy man to have around if anything happens to Marshall or Cameron. Andy Kyle, the local boy, was going like a house on fire yesterday morning. He would be a valuable addition to any club. Foyston, Walker and Cully Wilson displayed a lot of pep. Landru, a defenseman, and Malone, from Three Rivers, are two new forwards that want a job. Jack Marks of the Quebec team worked with the Blue shirts.

TRYING TO MAKE BASEBALL DEALS

New York Yankees May Change Hands—Giants Want C. Dooin.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—The National League of Professional Baseball Clubs closed its annual meeting here this afternoon after having been in session intermittently since Tuesday. Little business of importance was accomplished in the gathering, although a number of subjects were discussed before being laid over for further action at the scheduled meeting in February.

The major item of the day in assembling and President John K. Tener was obliged to leave for Harrisburg before the league meeting really got down to business. President Barney Dreyfuss of the Pittsburgh Club, and Secretary John A. Heydler of the league were appointed a committee to draft the 1915 playing schedule. It was also decided to continue the pension paid to Mrs. H. P. Fullam, wife of the former president of the league. No action was taken on the proposition to increase the world's series games from seven to nine, or eleven, after which was no mention made of Charles W. Murphy and his connection with the Chicago Club.

President Ban Johnson was not in evidence at the gathering of the National League managers, and it was understood that the American League executive was sending his team to the effort to complete the sale of the New York Yankees to Col. Jacob Ruppert. Early in the day, Johnson stated that he were no new developments in the proposed transfer of the franchise, but he hoped to complete the deal soon. It was reported that Johnson would confer with the Washington American Club, which had been in the week relative to the sale of the franchise.

While the National League officially closed its session with the afternoon, the managers of the various clubs were still endeavoring to arrange their business by sales or purchases late tonight. Several deals appeared to be partly consummated, and conferences were being held which involved the playing future of Philadelphia's "Doin" or the respective of the New York Yankees, respectively of the New York Yankees and Philadelphia National. It was generally believed that Dooin would join the Giants next spring, while the Phillies would obtain the services of several players in the trade.

Charles Herzog finally arranged with Garry Hermann to continue in the capacity of manager of the Cincinnati Club for another two years. Herzog, after a contract in which the salary clause was left blank, leaving it to the judgment of the chairman of the National Committee to fill in the right figures.

The International League Club owners, after a short session, adjourned until tomorrow morning. It was reported that no further progress in the reconstruction of the circuit could be made until the reports from the various leagues involved were received. It appeared to be the consensus of opinion, however, that Syracuse, N.Y., and Richmond, Va., would replace Jersey City and Baltimore in the 1915 playing circuit.
