*Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman who arrived in 1837,
through part of the United States and the Lakes, to his
Brother in England.*

London, Feb. 24, 1838.

I left New York on the 6th. inst., for Philadelphia,
Baltimore, Washington, &c., and after seeing every thing of
interest in these cities, I returned to New York on the 18th,
which I left on the 14th. for Niagara, by way of Albany,
Attica, Buffalo, &c., and reached the Falls on the 19th;
after seeing which, I left for this year (seasonally) and ar-
rived on 22nd. inst., so that I travelled about 1,700 miles
in 14 days. I have been much pleased with every thing,
and experienced civility and attention from every one I came
in contact with. The Falls of Niagara fell very much short
of my expectations, and in point of romantic scenery, are
very much exceeded by the Falls of Clief. There is, how-
ever, an appearance of comfort about all classes of society,
and every thing betwixt present and prospective prosperity.

Canada, so far as I can judge, is decidedly the best
country for emigrants to settle in, either as agriculturists or
merchants, and the prospects for both must continue to
improve.
