

## MUST GO TO LAW LORDS TO FIGHT CHEAP POWER

W. D. Beardmore's Appeal Against  
Hydro Legislation Dismissed  
by Justice Moss.

It remains for the privy council alone now to say whether the constitutionality of the hydro-electric legislation of the province, as raised in the Beardmore suit, shall be reviewed by the highest court of last resort or not. Judgment rendered by the Ontario Court of Appeals yesterday was adverse to Mr. Beardmore's application to proceed without first receiving specific permission.

The judgment given by Chief Justice Moss says:

"It is pointed out that case had narrowed down to the question of the question of the legislative competency of the legislature of the province to enact in whole or in part certain specific acts."

"The nature of the case and the questions raised undoubtedly bring it within the class of cases in which not infrequently the judicial committee of the privy council have considered it just and proper to advise his majesty to grant leave of appeal."

"But the granting or refusing of leave to appeal rests entirely with the judicial committee. The act under which this application is made does not confer on this court the power to deal with an application for leave to appeal. The power is to be given by the appellant where the case is one which comes within the classes specified in section two of the act. And the sole question here is whether this is such a case. It does not seem possible fairly to distinguish it from cases already decided by this court. These decisions were under the R.S.O. 1897, cap. 48, of which the present act is a revision and are really decisive of the question now before us. The application must be refused."

It is likely that the first Americans to be interviewed by Mr. Kustinsky will be John D. Rockefeller and Andrew Carnegie.

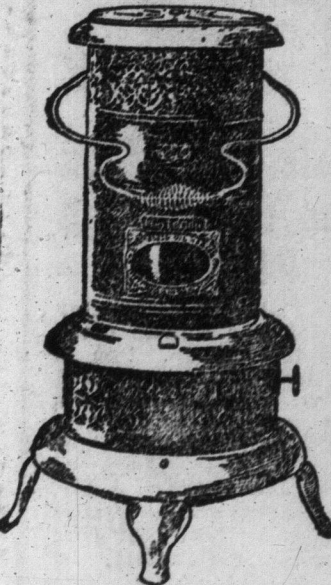
**A CORRECTION.**

### REPLY TO MR. RUSSELL

Secretary of Manitoba Grain Growers  
on His Canadian Club Speech.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 30.—(Special.—) Mackenzie, secretary of the Manitoba Grain Growers' Association replied to-day to the criticisms of T. A. Russell before the Canadian Club at Toronto, regarding the representative character of the big delegation which recently interviewed Premier Laurier. As an automobile manufacturer, protected by a 35 per cent. tariff, Mackenzie says Russell is taking \$350 out of the farmer for every thousand dollars the latter spends in his line, and as long as such conditions obtain, it is little use for the manufacturer trying to "take an interest in the farmer."

Mr. Russell, continued Mr. Mackenzie, seems to take a good deal of comfort out of the resolution passed by the Winnipeg Vegetable Growers' Association, which consists of probably fifty truck growers around Winnipeg. The western delegation represented 600 branches of the Grain Growers' Association, any one of which has a larger representation than the Winnipeg Vegetable Association. "The manufacturers," said Mackenzie, "are entitled to all the comfort they can receive out of setting up the opinion of this association against the opinion of western grain growers and the Grange of Toronto."
