The General Reform Association of Ontario met in the Labor Temple yesterday morning and was a thoroughly secret affair. Reporters, with the exception of two, who had credentials as representing party organs, were not admitted.

It was stated that there was no mention made of any change in the leadership of the party in Ontario. President H. M. Mowat, in his address, said that Canada was contented and hopeful, and Reformers were represented by hardworking ministers in a government which continued to "possess their genuine and unabated confidence."

The meeting in the town hall is scarcely known except in the excitement of the campaign, when party strife is high, and the utterances of statesmen are challenged from pure partisanship. NORTH DORCHESTER MAN
LEFT FORTUNE BY UNCLE

"Life" Goodnow Gets One Sixth of Estate Valued at Five Millions.

Thamesford, Sept. 5.—By the death of an uncle in New York, Lafayette Goodnow of North Dorchester has been left a fortune of \$500,000. Five million dollars were divided between Goodnow, his five brothers and sisters.

A few weeks ago Goodnow never dreamed of being rich. He knew that his uncle possessed wealth untold, but thought that upon his death it would be divided to some other resting place, as the ungenerous New York financier never kept in touch with the children of his brother, and they thought that because of his reticence or whatever it may be called, that he had placed them in the poor relation class and put his whole life into the accumulation of more for himself.

Goodnow has not even owned his farm up till this time. He was merely a tenant, and although he was always thrifty and comfortable, luxuries were almost unknown.

What his plans will be is not known. It is thought that he will erect a handsome home and continue to reside in North Dorchester.

He goes to New York in a short time in company with another brother, who resides in Western Ontario, to confer with the other relatives and the lawyers of his late uncle.

BORDEN MEETING CANCELED

Was to Have Spoken at New Glasgow, N.S., on Wednesday.

Pictou, N. S., Sept. 5.—(Staff Special.)—Nobody seems to know just why the Borden-Foster meeting that was to have been held to-day at New Glasgow was canceled.

C. E. Tanner, M.L.A., is unable to explain, although, as he came from Sydney to Pictou this morning, he has had many enquiries from Conservative workers at New Glasgow, Stellarton and other stations along the route.

It was a beautiful day and regatta expressed that the meeting could not have been held.

New Glasgow is a prosperous town in the mining district, and with the contiguous villages of Trenton and Ferris, has a population of at least 10,000. It is situated by the coast, with Stellarton and Westville, but a few miles away, indeed, in the colliery districts, one town in a fairly run into another. Pictou is quite convenient to Stellarton and New Glasgow, and this group of towns will include about 30,000 people.

The people are largely engaged in mining, and have inclined of late years to be quite inquisitive as to a political meeting, no better place than New Glasgow could be found in the mining district, and with the contiguous villages of Trenton and Ferris, has a population of at least 10,000.

Nevertheless, there will be a strong effort made to take a larger crowd from here to the meeting at Truro next Saturday.
