If so, a remedy is needed, for ministers are only ministers because they are politicians, and it is not fair to expect men to be it is not fair to expect men to be civil servants and commanding poli-

civil servants and commanding politicians as well.
"Perhaps it is because the people, acquiescing in the increased facility of the press, have become accustomed to obtain their political food from writings, and do not demand the direct utterances of party leaders. If this be so, it is not wholly satisfactory. It is quite obvious that in Ontario the understandings and collaboration between great parliamentarn between great parliame for virile and definite politics, largely a thing of the past.

The Party and the Press.

"It is said by some that great news-papers do not care to be tied up to party; that the party paper is not a money-maker. If this view is correct we have no right to quarrel with a any more than we would criticize any other man for the way he conducts his business. But the result is that the slashing newspaper article must be dispensed with. Editorials will be laden with caution, and items of po-litical news written with a view to litical news written with a view to acceptation by the opponent as well as the friend. The ardent party-man will find himself bereft of the strong meat required by a taste for fair invective. If he depends on his newspaper alone, he may fast become indifferent to the joys of party conflict. Therefore it seems to me that there
