## RAILWAYS RENEW OFFER PAY ONE-THIRD OF COST

Building of Yonge Street Bridge Again Subject For Discussion by Board of Control.

As the result of the renewal by the railways of the offer made some time ago for the building of Yonge-street bridge, the board of control will confer with General Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk, in the hope that a satisfactory agreement may be reached.

The proposal that the city should agree to the previous offer of the railways was made in communications from A. B. Creelman, solicitor of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and W. H. Biggar, solicitor of the Grand Trunk, the latter intimating that C. M. Hays had approved such an agreement.

Mr. Creelman's proposition was that the railway companies pay one-third each of the whole cost, the city including land damage, but not land sustained by the city; that, after completion, the bridge be maintained by the city and the two companies in equal proportion, namely, one-third each subject to a new apportionment, either by agreement or by reference to the railway commissioners when the bridge was used by the Toronto Railway Company. The cost, if any, of the work imposed upon the city by the windmill line agreement, not to be included in the cost of the bridge.

The letter added that if the proposal were accepted the railway companies would withdraw the legal objections to the existing order now being dealt with in the litigation.

No Sunday Concerts.

The request of the Canadian National Sunday League, made thru Secretary J. Enoch Thompson, that the stand in Queen's Park might be available for use on Sundays for the rendering of sacred band concerts by members of the league, who would give their services gratuitously, was refused by the board.

A decision was reached to oppose the board's application for a patent of water lots south of Queen's Wharf. The new mortgage on Adelaide-street will cost \$28,248 to build, this amount being the total of the tenders for the different branches of the work received by the board of control and the estimated cost, including the furniture, was \$35,000.

The purchase of a block of land, on the north side of Gerrard-street, adjoining River-street on the east, with a frontage of 350 feet, and containing over an acre, was approved by the board. The cost is \$9500.

For the Majority.

Ald. McGhie, who has been talked of for some months as a possible 1908 mayoralty candidate, intimates that it is his intention to compete. Ald. Geary has expressed a like purpose.

Neither the Dominion nor the provincial government will take part in the level crossings suit to be argued before the judicial committee of the privy council, so the city's legal department states.

TOO MANY ELECTROCUTIONS.

District Attorney Will Enquire Into Lineman's Death.

BUFFALO, June 7.—District Attorney Abbott has begun an investigation into the death of Warner Houck, a telephone lineman, who was electrocuted to-day. "Houck" was splicing the loose ends of a telephone wire, which came in contact with an electric light line. He was instantly killed.

District Attorney Abbott said that accidental electrocutions are becoming too frequent in the city, and that the beginning of criminal action against corporations whose overhead wires are dangerous.

FRANCE WILLING TO HELP.

Tenders Kindly Assistance to Cement U.S.-Japanese Good Feeling.

PARIS, June 7.—One of the immediate results of the Franco-Japanese entente, which is on the point of being signed, has been the tender by France of her good offices to the United States in case, she can be of service in promoting a complete understanding between the United States and Japan, covering their respective interests in the far east.

## PRINCE FUSHIMI'S TOUR.

Grand Trunk Have Completed All Arrangements For Royal Trip.

All arrangements for the tour of General H. I. H. Prince Fushimi thru the Grand Trunk Railway System, who will convey the party over their lines thru Quebec and Ontario, with the exception of the journey between Levis and Montreal, which will be made over the Intercolonial Railway. The Imperial train will be composed of a baggage car, two sleeping cars and two private cars. The party will leave Bonaventure Station, Montreal, Monday morning, June 10th, at 10 o'clock, and will arrive at New York, Tuesday, June 11th. Next day the journey will be continued to Brookville, at which point steamer will be taken for the trip thru the Thousand Islands to Kingston, where train will be awaiting to convey the distinguished party to Niagara Falls. After spending a few hours at the great Falls, the party will leave for Toronto, arriving there at 2:55 p.m. June 12th, remaining in Toronto until the following morning at 10 o'clock, when the journey to the Pacific Coast will be continued over the Northern Division of the Grand Trunk via North Bay.

The principal stations along the line will be profusely decorated, the imperial colors—scarlet and white—predominating, and British and Japanese flags in profusion. In connection with this important tour, the Grand Trunk will present his Imperial Majesty and suite with a set of edition de luxe souvenir booklets descriptive of the railway and country through which he will pass, richly bound in handsome covers. They will include the following:

An Annotated Time-Table, printed on hand-made antique paper, enhanced with a series of illustrations in color, printed by the Prisma Print process. This Time-Table contains the names of every station passed, with descriptive notes regarding the interesting features en route, the time of the train at each station, the altitude above sea level at each point, population, and distance from Montreal. The whole will be enclosed in a handsome crimson morocco, title page being stamped in gold, with the Japanese Coat-of-Arms, and the word "Welcome" in Japanese characters.

Mr. H. R. Charlton will be the official representative of the Grand Trunk who will accompany the Imperial party while on their lines.

THIS A LUCKY BOY.

Twice Struck by Train and Keeps on Running.

LONDON, June 7.—A five-year-old boy fell to-day from a train that was running near Twyford. He was not hurt and ran to rejoin the train, which he had, in the meantime, had stopped.

Before the boy reached the train an express passed along the parallel track, and knocked him down, passing over him. The boy immediately rose and continued running to meet his father. His head was cut and streaming blood, but he was not seriously hurt.

## SECOND WARD FIGURES SHOW BIG INCREASES

Advance of More Than Million Dollars in the Values of Real Property.

Bounding prosperity in the Second Ward is shown by the assessment returns issued yesterday afternoon by Commissioner Fortman.

The total assessment for the ward for 1908 of \$28,122,041, compares with \$26,846,373 for last year, an increase of \$1,275,668. A comparison with the assessment of 10 years ago, shows an advance of \$7,064,000 over the then figures of \$11,058,041.

The population as shown by the returns is 44,465, as against 43,297 for last year, or an advance of 1178, being 2.45 per cent. Last year the ratio of advance was 9-10 of 1 per cent. Ten years ago, the population was 34,473.

It will be noted that the increase in land value for the year is \$334,997, which is mainly contributed by Rosedale with an increase of \$278,000. North Rosedale annex making up \$22,000 of the amount.

The increase in the value of buildings over last year is \$723,565. Rosedale being again to the fore with an increase of \$453,000, towards which the North Rosedale annex contributes \$40,000. Sherbourne-street provides \$25,000. Parliament-street \$16,000, and Queen-street \$20,000.

The increase in the business assessment of \$25,470 is mainly in the lower part Ward 2 and is due to the increases in land and new business enterprises.

On incomes, there is an advance of \$166,321, of which \$120,000 comes from Rosedale, the total increase being over 20 per cent.

The statement that follows shows the increases in detail: Division No. 1 takes in the northern portion of Ward 2, and Division No. 2 the lower portion.
