QUEBEC LAWYERS OBJECT TO JUDGE'S DELIVERY

Had No Right, They Declare, to Use Language He Did in Asselin Case.

QUEBEC, Nov. 1.—(Special).—The bar of Quebec on complaint of Mr. Allyn Taschereau, Mr. Asselin's lawyer, has adopted on division the following resolution concerning the wording of Judge Elmore's decision against Asselin in the action for libel taken against him by Mr. Turgeon: "That without entering into the merits of the judgment rendered on Oct. 17, 1907, in the case of the Hon. Mr. Turgeon against Le Nationaliste, this council considers it its duty to acknowledge the receipt of the complaint of Mr. Allyn Taschereau, member of the bar of this section. The members of the council cannot, without regret, hear a magistrate expressing himself in such words as the following: 'The duty of an advocate consists in defending even the greatest criminals, but that duty should not be fulfilled in such a manner as to countenance calumnies which have no foundation whatever,' words which are of a nature to cause upon the public minds an injurious impression that lawyers are willing to 'countenance calumnies which are without foundation.'"

LOD BISHOP OF LONDON THINKS WELL OF CANADA

Prime Minister of Canada Taught Him How to Eat Corn Off the Cob—Religious Harmony.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—(C.A.P. cable).—The Bishop of London, recounting his tour to Canada in the diocesan magazine, speaks of the loyalty of the French-Canadians, and says it is gratifying to find in Quebec, under the genial guidance of the governor-general, a bishop of Quebec. Both races and both branches of the church get on so well together, he remarks, that at Ottawa, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at the same club luncheon, showed him how to eat corn on the cob.

He expressed himself as much interested and even affected by an account of the stunts of London. The bishop speaks highly of the beauties of Quebec, and describes Toronto as one of the fairest cities in the world. He concludes that he left Canada with a great idea, not only of the love of Canada for the mother country but for anyone who came to it.

CHOLERA AT KIEFF.

Analysis of the New Russian Deputies.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 1.—There were seven hundred cases of cholera in Kieff in the last fortnight. About a third of the vote has been cast in the St. Petersburg elections to-day. The results are unknown. Among the 331 deputies already chosen are thirty marshals of the nobility, seven members of the governor's council, seventeen ministerial officials, one senator, one candidate formerly a governor and numerous retired officers, including a general of gendarmes, in Orlov; five marshals of the nobility in a deputation of nine in Tamboff. Six out of twelve are officials.

The average age is much greater than previously. Thirty per cent. are under thirty, and only five per cent. are under thirty. As compared with twenty years ago, the educational average is about the same as in the first duma, which exceeded the second.

FISH REJOICE.

Will Get Fewer Hooks—Won't Decrease the Duty.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Great was the rejoicing among the fish in New York waters when they learned yesterday that Uncle Sam had decided there should be no reduction in the price of fish-hooks. Some of the more optimistic denizens of the deep took the decision in the nature of an emancipation. The prohibitive price of steel has also served to encourage the fish. "Boost the price of the hook," said a soured mackerel in discussing the decision, "and there'll be no more of us folk decorating a marble slab. I don't object to having a millionaire on the other end of my line, but the thought of being hooked by a vulgar 'longshoreman' makes me shudder every time I see a pair of overalls."

The board of general appraisers yesterday made the fish-hook rule. An importing house protested against a duty of 40 per cent. ad valorem and 1-14 cents a pound on fish-hooks, saying it was excessive. The protest was overruled.

A HERMIT'S HOARD.

Had Fifteen Thousand Dollars Hidden Away.

HEMPSTEAD, L.I., Nov. 1.—William Henry Jay, eighty-nine years old, a hermit of the plains adjoining the Salisbury golf links, died yesterday in his little hut, leaving in cash hidden away from \$12,000 to \$15,000.

Jay had long lived in the little hut, with the windows stopped with boards and rags, and a small farm surrounding it. Children have for many years feared the place because of a story of ghosts seen about the place. At times, and the lonely and aged man, who was occasionally seen around the place, was never disturbed, being feared by the youngsters.

Rumor has it that Jay lived the life of a hermit because of a disappointment. After Jay's death his hut was taken possession of by his cousins, who, it is said, found thousands of dollars hidden away in books and other places. The money has been placed in a vault and the hermit's treasure is being guarded by a police force.

Christmas in Europe. In December each year a great many people intending spending the holiday in Europe are disappointed in not being able to sail on the ship they had wished to on account of the accommodation being engaged so far ahead. The majority of people think that winter ships go half full and that there is no occasion to reserve accommodation far in advance. This is certainly not the experience of the Cunard Line.
