SPAIN HEARS FRONT

Great Activity in All Her Ports—Six Ironclads and Three Cruisers Preparing.

New York, Dec. 1.—A despatch to The Journal from Madrid, says: Great activity continues in all Spanish ports, particularly in Cartagena, where the particularly available strength is now confined to fitting out six ironclads and three cruisers, which, with the Glasgow torpedo boat destroyer, will form a powerful flying squadron. It is said the Spanish Government has accepted specifications for a powerful battleship and a cruiser. But as no money whatever has come to hand, nothing has yet been done towards their construction. In case of need the cruiser could be ready in a year, but it would take twice as long to finish the ironclad. The cruiser is designed for exceptional speed and would be able to coal for 3000 knots at 23 knots hourly.
