New York, July 23,-The U.S. hospita ship Relief arrived at quarantine this atternoon from Siboney, with 125 sick and wounded officers and soldiers from Santiago. The Relief left New York on July 2, just 21 days ago, fully equipped with a skilled corps of nurses and all modern surgical appliances and instruments for the treatment of the sick and wounded soldiers, in charge of Major Torney, Surgeon U.S.A. During the 21 days that the geon, U.S.A. During the 21 days that the Relief has been in commission, she has received on board 265 sick and wounded soldiers. Of this number 13 have died and a large number have been transferred to the Seneca, Solace and Hudson. Of the 125 men now on board the Relief there are only about five dangerously wounded.
