Widow and Widower First United in Michigan and Then Parted by Law.

Windsor, May 4.-The marriage of nson at the Bruce-avenue Baptist Church parsonage, Windsor, yesterday afternoon was the sequel to an unfor-

afternoon was the sequel to an unfortunate predicament, in which the couple found themselves.

Bullock and his bride are children of two sisters. Both were married years ago and lost track of each other. However, they met again last year, Bullock a widower and his cousin a widow and as they always had a tender feeling for each other a proposal of marriage from Bullock was agreeable to Mrs. Robinson, and they were married several months ago by a Baptist minister at their home in Salem, Mich. Prior to the marriage they enquired of a Salem judge if there is any law prohibiting the marriage of cousins in Michigan, and he told them there is not. Some time after their marriage Mrs. Bullock was told by a friend that she was not legally married to Bullock, and she at once sought the advice of a Salem lawyer. He explained that the marriage was not a legal one, and showed her the clause in the statute relating to the marriage of relatives. She then paid a visit to the judge who had first advised her, and he excused himself by saying that he had no knowledge of such a law.

As soon as Mr. Bullock was satisfied that the marriage was illegal in Michigan she separated from Bullock, and at first intended leaving Salem. Bullock persuaded her to remain in the town for a time while he corresponded with different states to ascertain if there is a place where cousins legally may be married. He finally discovered that the laws of Ontario recognize such marriages, and he communicated the intelligence to his cousin. She was willing to have another ceremony performed, providing it was lawful, and was also highly elated that the tangle could be straightened out satisfactorily. Accordingly, they arrived in Windsor yesterday, and after telling their story and securing a license they went to the parsonage and were quietly married.

Fate of the Two Reckless Youths of Good Family Who Held Up C. P. R. Express.

Winnipeg, May 4.—(Special.)—The Gates boys, two of the three men who held up and robbed the C.P.R, westbound express at Whonnock on Sept. 9
last, will never answer to the courts
for their many crimes. George, the
elder, and Edward Vernon, the younger,
were shot to death near Separ, New
Mexico, by a posse of angered citizens
of the town of Lordsburg, in the same
state. From information in the hands
of the C. P. R. secret service department the Gates boys came north into
Canada shortly after the robbery of
the Southern Pacific express car in
California, when Express Messenger
O'Neil was shot and killed. The Gates
boys made their way into Cariboo and
spent the summer months working in
the mines. On toward the latter part
of August they communicated with Bill
Miner and by some means managed to
secure information concerning the shipment of \$60,000 of gold dust to be made
to Vancouver. The gang came down to
Vancouver and awaited information as
to the time the gold dust/would be
placed on the train at Ashcroft. Word
was sent from the mine that the shipment would leave Sept. 9, but in interpreting the message the gang read
the message to mean the shipment
would be made from Ashcroft on Sept.
9 and planned acordingly. They held
up the express and got only \$7000, as
the gold was not shipped till Sept. 11.

Two men held up a saloon in Loidsburg on March 15 and with their loot
hurried off to the mountains. After a
hot chase the posse overtook the robbers at Separ and the two men showed
resistance and were killed. Their
youthful appearance caused the authorities to institute an investigation and
discover their identity, through*photographs in the possession of the Pinkerton Detective Agency.

George Gates was twenty-six years
of age and his brother-Vernon twentytwo. They are sons of a well-to-do mining man, G. G. Gates, living with his
daughter in Alameda. The father endeavored in every way to induce his
wayward sons to reform but he had no
influence over George, and the latter
influenced Vernon.'
