SWIFT MONEY-MAKING.
Gold Brick Work \$35.71 for Less Than Fifteen Days' Work in Mining.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 23.—The gold brick from the Cariboo Hydraulic mine is in its way here. It is valued at \$35.71, and is the product of fourteen days, 20 hours run in on the pit. This makes \$118,900 mined so far this season. The hydraulic will go on until cold weather stops operations.

The Two Friends Mining Company, owning a claim in the Stocan district, received returns yesterday from the Tacoma smelter of the first carload of ore shipped. It gives a net value of \$164.20 per ton. Deducting the cost of mining and hauling to water, the net return is about \$121 per ton. The mine will now be a regular shipper. About 750 tons of ore is being already blocked out on the camp.

The Premier at Quebec.

Hon. Wilfrid Laurier was entertained to a banquet by the citizens of Quebec last (Wednesday) night. The affair was a great success. It took place at the Chateau Frontenac, and was attended by 350 leading citizens. Had there been accommodation, the numbers present would have been doubled. Mayor Parent presided, and proposed the health of the Premier, who, in rising to reply, was greeted with loud cheering. He said the Government was a body of business men, bent on doing justice to all. In the forthcoming tariff revision, the interests of the producer and the consumer would both be looked after. Dealing specially with the interests of Quebec, the Premier said the canals must be deepened so as to increase Canada's trade by way of the St. Lawrence. But the Government had to look to its means in the execution of that great work, and to go slow. The policy of the Government was to have a fast Atlantic steamship service for freight as well as passengers. Mr. Laurier said he would keep his promise to have the Manitoba school question settled within six months after election day. The settlement, he added, will preserve all the rights of conscience.

The Premier concluded this reference as follows:

"Those who believe that religion should be taught in the schools shall have satisfaction. We have obtained all the concessions which any honest man would have the right to expect. I do not pretend that we shall meet the views of the extremists. There are those in Manitoba who are conceding, and we have those in the Province of Quebec who would not be satisfied unless we exacted the pound of flesh which we have the right to get out of the bosom of Manitoba, nor until we shall have inflicted upon that Province the direct humiliation. But speaking for the City of Quebec, for this Province, and may say, for the whole Dominion, the people are not of that opinion. We, especially French-Canadians, we know what it is to be a minority and to be oppressed. Had we the power we would not inflict any such humiliation. We wish to deal with others as we would have others do with us."

Such a settlement, sincere men of every religious belief could fairly be appealed to endorse. To the charge that the Government has proceeded too slowly, Mr. Laurier said:

"We have been in power four months; give us time. As I have kept my promise concerning the school question, so shall we keep our promises respecting all reforms, and with the assistance of the eternal and immutable Providence, we shall give to the country peace, harmony and prosperity."

These sentiments were cheered to the echo.

Topics of Today.
Hugh John Macdonald, son of the late Premier, entertained Hon. Mr. Tarte, Minister of Public Works, at a banquet in Winnipeg yesterday. Mr. Tarte has also been the guest of Lieutenant-Governor Patterson.

The New York Daily Recorder died while shouting about its enormous circulation. It only existed two years.

The procession of the students of the Western University through the streets of London today emphasises the growth of that institution of learning in recent years. It is questionable if a finer looking body of young men can be got together in any college town on the continent.

The Saskatchewan Liberals will convene on November 25 to elect a candidate for the Commons.

According to advices received at the Fisheries Department, Ottawa, Lake Winnipeg's waters are two feet higher than ever known before. This is somewhat extraordinary in view of the low water in the great lakes, it may be but a precursor to higher water in these lakes, also.

Hon. Wm. Patterson, Minister of Customs, is straightening out shortcomings that have been found to exist at Montreal.

The Northwest Legislature have resolved in favor of the construction of the Crow's Nest Pass to the Rocky Mountain gold mines. So do we all. What is needed is the finances to pay for the much-needed public work.

Hon. Mr. Blair was last night entertained at a banquet by the citizens of Peterboro. The Minister of Railways and Canals has been investigating the Trent Valley Canal works.

KILLED FOUR MEN!
Sepoy Soldier Runs Amuck With Frightful Results.

Sima, Oct. 23.—A Sepoy belonging to the British Indian troops stationed at Fort Sandeman ran amuck yesterday evening and killed Lieut. Yeates, of the Royal Engineers, Lieut. Downes, of the Bombay Lancers, and two private soldiers, besides wounding Lieut. Macleachlan. The murderer was captured.

Bismarck's Official Organ Creating Considerable Discord.

Four Men Murdered by Frenzied Sepoy Soldier.

STRIKE IN CONSTANTINOPLE.
Constantinople, Oct. 23.—All the workmen at the arsenal struck today. The cause of the strike is the non-payment of arrears in wages.

BREAD DEARER.
London, Oct. 23.—The price of bread has gone up one halfpenny, and the increase is being acutely felt in the poorer districts of London, where many families have in consequence been obliged to reduce their supplies.

JOSEPH THEIR FAVORITE.
Glasgow, Oct. 23.—The students of the Glasgow University held a meeting last evening and nominated Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies, for the lord rectorship of that institution.

THE SULTAN IN A SHIVER.
London, Oct. 23.—A Daily Mail correspondent says an Imperial yacht is anchored off the Eildiz Kiosk and is closely guarded night and day. A submarine passage leading from the palace to the seashore is constantly lighted and heavily guarded.

CONSPIRACY OF THE PHILIPPINES.
Madrid, Oct. 23.—An official dispatch from Manila says that a conspiracy has been discovered in the Sulu Archipelago, a portion of the Spanish colony of the Philippine Islands. Eight soldiers have already been killed in the attempt to suppress the uprising. Reinforcements of troops have been sent from Manila.

LADY SOMERSET'S OFFER.
London, Oct. 23.—Lady Henry Somerset, president of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Great Britain, has sent the following cablegram to Mr. Edward F. Mcweeney, assistant United States commissioner of emigration, on Ellis Island, New York harbor: "I have made the declaration and will give a personal bond that if any of the Armenians arriving in New York by the steamers Odam or California become public charges, I will be answerable for their removal from the United States."

SALE OF COSTLY HORSEFLESH.
Newmarket, Oct. 23.—The entire stock of American horses belonging to Mr. Enoch Withard were sold today at Tattersall's, and fetched 7,570 guineas. There was a large crowd present, including the Duke of York, Sir John Bunnell, Lord Rendlesham, and Sir Maurice and Lady Fitzgerald. Geo. H. K. Mansbach was sold for 1,200 guineas. A horse was knocked down to Sir J. Duke for 400 guineas, and Hugh Penny went to F. W. Day for 420 guineas.

PERILS OF THE DEEP.
London, Oct. 23.—The Italian bark Africa (Capt. Casasco), from Chatham, N. B., Sept. 18, which has arrived at Bristol, reports having encountered severe weather on the passage. When off the Lundy Islands she shipped a great quantity of water, which washed over-board of her deck load and did sundry damage about her decks.

The British ship Vanloo (Capt. Baker), from St. John, N. B., which was aground while entering Swansea, has been floated and docked.

The German bark William Bateman (Capt. Moritz), from Poughwash, N. S., for Havre, before reported ashore at Southport and seriously damaged, and which was subsequently towed to her destination, has discharged her cargo and been condemned.

DISTRESS IN INDIA.
London, Oct. 23.—In the course of his address at Leeds, the Marquis of Lansdown, Secretary of State for War, said that the India Government felt the gravest fears as to the possible loss of life from famine, and he suggested that the undertaking of irrigation works would do the most good towards relieving the distress.

Sima, Oct. 23.—The famine outlook in India is increasing in gloominess. It is not probable now that rain will fall, and the prospects are serious in the Northwest and Central Provinces and in the Punjab. The scarcity is extending to Behar, and at Bombay prices have risen heavily. Large imports of foreign grain are expected. About 30 lakhs of rupees have already been given from the imperial revenues for advances of seeds, etc., and relief works in the Northwest, Central Provinces, and Rajputana are being started in addition to the irrigation works which are projected in the Punjab. The Government will issue a detail and final forecast of the distress in December.

PLENTY OF DISCORD
Created by Bismarck's Organ the Ham-burger Nachrichten.

London, Oct. 23.—The German Government is profoundly irritated at the disclosures made by the Hamburger Nachrichten, Prince Bismarck's organ, in stating that a defensive alliance existed between Russia and Germany during the last years Prince Bismarck was in office.

It is also stated that the Government is thinking of prosecuting the Hamburger Nachrichten and those by whom it is inspired, evidently referring to the ex-Chancellor.

Paris, Oct. 23.—Two of the most conservative of the Paris papers—the Figaro, the representative of the bourgeoisie of France, and the Gaulois, the organ of the royalist society—publish sharp attacks on Prince Bismarck on account of the revelations regarding the Russo-German relations in the Hamburger Nachrichten, for which he is held responsible.

The Gaulois concludes that the main effect of the Hamburger Nachrichten articles will be to weaken the triple alliance, which is already failing to pieces. The Gaulois says that it will be curious and instructive if he whose object was to isolate France should witness the isolation of his own country, for which he is held responsible.

SNOW IN PORTUGAL.
A Severe Storm—Fourteen Fishermen Drowned.

Lisbon, Oct. 23.—A severe storm prevails along the coast of Portugal. A fishing boat has been lost near Setubal, eighteen miles east of this city. Fourteen fishermen were drowned.

BANK OF ENGLAND
Changing Four and a Half Per Cent Discount—The Weekly Statement.

London, Oct. 23.—Although the bank rate was not changed today at the meeting of the directors of the Bank of England, that institution has adopted the unusual course of charging 4 1/2 per cent discount. It is believed that the object is to bring the rate effective in the open market.

The weekly statement of the bank, issued today, shows the following changes, as compared with the previous account: Total reserve, increased £4,400,000; circulation, decreased £271,000; bullion, increased £2,855,000; other securities, decreased £1,515,000; other deposits, decreased £2,190,000; public deposits, increased £14,000; notes reserve, increased £181,000; Government securities, decreased £15,000. The proportion of the Bank of England's reserve to liability, which last week was 50.55 per cent, is now 53.10 per cent.

TOLD TOO MUCH
But the German Government Dare Not Prosecute Bismarck's Organ.

London, Oct. 23.—A special dispatch from Berlin says that it is understood there that the proposed prosecution of Prince Bismarck's organ, the Hamburger Nachrichten, for publishing state secrets has been abandoned out of fear of harm such a step might do to Germany's foreign policy. It is added that, however, should Prince Bismarck publish the charges against him, the Government will be forced to act, and it is said it would probably treat Prince Bismarck in the same manner that the latter treated Count von Arnim, who died in May, 1881, at Nice, as a result—it was said by Prince Bismarck's enemies—of the persecution which he had been subjected to by the Chancellor.
