## CAUGHT BY THE CLICKER

J. F. Caldwell is said to have sold the famous Sultana mine, Rat Portage, Man., for \$1,200,000.

Particulars have been filed in the motion to unseat J. W. Holmes, the Liberal member for Haldimand.

The general store of Alex. Watson, at Kilmount, was damaged by fire on Wednesday night; no insurance.

The North Essex election protest against the return of Mr. W. J. McKee, the Liberal member, has been dismissed.

Mr. David Noe, of Lurgan, has been appointed postmaster of that place, in place of Mr. J. W. Gamble, recently retired.

The trial of the West York protest against W. J. Hill began Thursday morning before Judges Street and Fairclough.

The Bank of Commerce, Chicago, with \$500,000 capital and \$1,000,000 deposits, has voted to go into voluntary liquidation.

Clem Wise came into contact with a live electric light wire at Toledo while making repairs. He died in great agony from burns.

The marine underwriters at Montreal announce war risks as follows: One-eighth to 1 per cent on British, and 2 per cent on French vessels.

Texas has voted to amend its constitution so as to grant a pension of \$3 per month to ex-confederate soldiers who resided in the state since 1880.

George S. Lieber, 30 years old, a traveling salesman, killed himself in the Grand Central Hotel, New York, by inhaling illuminating gas. Financial difficulties.

The body of George Belanger, of Detroit, who was drowned in the wreck of the Nassau on Oct. 15, was found on the beach near Annetburg Wednesday at 4 p.m.

A party of seven California gold-seekers, headed by A. F. Englehardt, are reported to have been overwhelmed in quicksand while trying to reach the Alaska field.

President McKinley leaves Washington Tuesday for Canton, where he will stay Tuesday. He registered by proxy. Cabinet ministers will all follow the presidential example.

Chas. F. Defreytas, of Halifax, bookseller and stationer, committed suicide in the cellar of his store by shooting himself in the head. He made an assignment three days before.

Edward Hartnett, the Toronto Grand Trunk watchman who shot Hugh Sheridan, a tramp who was trespassing on the track on Oct. 7, was committed for trial, bail being refused.

Miss Della Bulck, school teacher at Mt. Pleasant, Mich., took morphine to allay the pain caused by an aching tooth. She died early next morning. It is believed she took an overdose by mistake.

The East Northumberland election trial was brought to a conclusion on Thursday afternoon, and the election of J. H. Douglas, Liberal, was voided by consent. Mr. Douglas had over 400 majority.

Cuban girls joined Generals Wado, Butler and the American evacuation commissioners in strewing flowers on the graves of the Maine disaster victims in Colon cemetery, Havana, on Wednesday.

A fire which is said to be a Michigan Central engine, destroyed \$50,000 worth of property at Lapeer, Mich. One of the heaviest losers is Richard King, whose big lumber and shingle mill was totally destroyed.

Engineers investigating the cause of the recent collapse of the New York and Ottawa Railway bridge at Cornwall report that the pier was built on hardpan of insufficient strength to stand the huge weight.

The liquidation trustees of the Standard Oil trust have divided from the income of the corporate stocks still remaining in their hands a sum equal to \$3 per share and a further sum equal to \$4 per share, both payable Dec. 16, 1898.

When the U. S. transport Peru (now at San Francisco) left Manila there were 1,500 sick among the men and the physicians were terribly dismayed at the progress that smallpox was making. In one day there were ten deaths from smallpox.

Miss Florence George and Miss Kate McLeod, both of Washington, D. C., were killed by a Baltimore and Ohio Railroad train Wednesday night, at Langdon, Md. They had been attending a party and were crossing the tracks when they were struck by an express train.

Wh. Cain, 40 years of age, and Patrick Nolan, machine man, both employed at the Sunset No. 2 mine, Rossland, were overcome by gas and fell from the ladder in the shaft on Tuesday night. Their bones were broken in the fall. Jim McCarthy and Pat Quinn lost their lives while getting Cain's body.

## FRANCE DOESN'T WANT TO FIGHT

Britain's Gallic Neighbors Not Prepared.

And Fashoda Is Not Worth the Powder.

Dupuy Will Recall Marchand, for Whose Mission He Is Not Responsible.

Official Notes Indicate That the War Clouds Are Breaking Away—Important Statement From Salisbury Expected Tonight.

Paris, Nov. 4.—France is regarding England with anxious eyes. Everything indicates the warlike spirit prevailing across the channel. All the journals record the British naval preparations with pessimistic comments.

Nobody here desires war. In the first place, Fashoda is not worth it. In the second place, France is not ready. If force is resorted to it will be England that insists upon it.

The Temps even advocates the avoidance of a struggle at any cost, and hints that England is in a stronger position, but that if she pushes France too hard she risks bringing about an European coalition against her everywhere abroad.

The Liberte says: "There are many points in Great Britain's empire where she may be attacked. Her name is not exactly venerated in Ireland. Where a revolution might break out the moment war was declared; besides, which, it seems fairly certain that a strong Abyssinian force is rapidly drawing near Fashoda."

WILL RECALL MARCHAND.

London, Nov. 4.—The most reliable information from Paris confirms the earlier reports that M. Dupuy, the premier, has decided to wash his hands of Fashoda, and to recall Major Marchand, for whose mission he is not responsible. This decision is to some extent a desire to avoid nothing to interfere with the success of the exposition of 1900.

The Cairo correspondent of the Daily Mail says: "Major Marchand, who is extremely modest, makes light of his exploits. He is fond of exploration, and sorry there are no more routes to conquer."

MARCHAND'S MOVEMENTS.

Cairo, Nov. 4.—Major Marchand, the commander of the French expedition at Fashoda, arrived here at 7 o'clock last evening. He was met at the railroad station by the French officials and residents. The explorer looked thin and worried. Directly the major appeared at the door of the train the spectators rushed forward waving their hats, sticks and handkerchiefs, and crying: "Vive Marchand!" The latter drove off to the French diplomatic affairs, amid more cheering. Only two Bengalese soldiers accompanied Major Marchand, whose future movements depend upon the instructions which Capt. Baratier brings him. M. Delcasse, the French minister of foreign affairs, and the Marquis of Salisbury will first to "receive all the news which may contribute to the harmony of the two countries." The French commander expressed himself as being much gratified at the kindness shown by the British officers during his journey to this place.

AN IMPORTANT DAY.

London, Nov. 4.—Today will be important in the history of the crisis. It is expected that Baron de Courcel, the French ambassador, will impart the French decision to Lord Salisbury, who will speak this evening at the banquet to be given to the sirdar, General Lord Kitchener.

The Daily Chronicle, under reserve, publishes a remarkable story suggesting that the sirdar captured documents proving that Major Marchand, before the battle of Omdurman, sent to the khallifa a French flag, inviting him to host it, and so, by becoming a French ally, to deter the Anglo-Egyptian force from attacking him.

London, Nov. 3.—An official note, issued this evening, says: "There is no good reason to hope that the political situation is ameliorating. It can be confidently stated that when the cause of the irritation, which unfortunately recently existed in France and Great Britain and on the Upper Nile is removed, which is expected soon to be the case, the door will again be open to the resumption of those friendly negotiations, which happily characterize the normal state of the relations between the two countries."

The Evening News publishes what purports to be a French official note, stating that Marchand will evacuate Fashoda and the five posts in the Bahrel-Ghazal Province next to it. His party will proceed under the friendly escort of Egyptian troops. On the accomplishment of this, it is stated, negotiations will be opened on the proposals submitted by Baron de Courcel.

## THE GOLD OUTPUT.

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Capt. John J. Healy, vice-president of the North American Transportation and Trading Company, who has just returned from a six-years' sojourn in the Klondike, said in an interview today:

"The truth about the Yukon country is that it will yield \$30,000,000 between now and next October, and with the completion of government roads and the operation of quartz-mining machinery, the output will amount to \$100,000,000 in gold annually. In the next five years 100,000 whites will be at work in the Yukon, and 100 years' steady mining will not exhaust the profitable mines in Alaska."

"Now the question arises," said Mr. Healy, "how the statements are going to be reconciled with the hard-fuck tales brought of the Yukon. Whether it is believed or not the simple truth is this: Scores of men who have gone in don't know pay dirt when they see it. They are farmers and greenhorns, and cannot set a sluice-box or make a riffle to save their lives. A sluice-box must have a certain pitch, or the washings will not pan out. Some are quick to catch on to these things while others are not."

## TURNING OUT THE TURKS!

International Troops Take Possession of the Canes Fortress.

Abdul Hamid Requested to Take His Troops as Speedily as Possible—The Sultan's Concession to the Kaiser—Radical Success in the German Elections.

Canea, Island of Crete, Nov. 4.—The international troops occupied the fortress here at 5 o'clock this morning.

The foreign admirals had previously informed the Turkish Government of Crete that they would proceed with the military occupation of the various administrative offices of the island on Nov. 4, and the Turkish officials will not hereafter be permitted to re-enter. The Turkish troops now on the island will cease to be regarded as garrisoning Crete, and the Turkish military posts and military services will be abolished. The admirals also ask the governor to embark all the Turkish troops that the transports in Canea Bay will hold, and to request his government to speedily send enough ships to embark the remainder.

GAINS BY THE GERMAN RADICALS.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—The election of Prussian deputies at the secondary elections, so far as known, shows that the Radicals have an increase of 15 seats, at the expense of the Conservatives and National Liberals. In Berlin the Radicals have had a complete walk-over, nine of the candidates being elected, among them Prof. Virchow, the celebrated pathologist.

THE SULTAN'S GIFT TO THE KAISER.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—Emperor William's visit to Constantinople has resulted in the agreement with the sultan whereby the latter gives the Kaiser the right to plant a large German colony along the whole frontier of Tripoli. This arrangement will protect the sultan from French encroachments across the Tripoli-Tunis frontier, and will avoid granting a concession in Asia Minor, which would induce Russia to demand compensation.

CABLE NOTES.

Berliners think Kaiser Wilhelm's acquisition of land in Jerusalem and his presentation to Catholics is the consummation of a scheme to modify the Catholic party in the reichstag.

The Canadian Pacific officials here deny most positively that the admiralty has requisitioned the whole or any part of the company's Pacific fleet of steamers for the purpose of carrying them temporarily in auxiliary cruisers.

It is understood in London authority that negotiations for the fast Atlantic mail service are still in progress, and that the government is showing some anxiety to secure a successful issue at the earliest possible moment.

Baroness De Roque, mother of Mrs. Florence Maybrick, is continuing her efforts to obtain the release of her daughter, who is serving a sentence of life imprisonment for the murder of her husband.

## IS BRITAIN PREPARING

For One Grand Coup to Settle Perplexing Questions?

The Fashoda Incident Opens the Way for an Important Step—Concerted Movement of Chinese Troops.

Buffalo, Nov. 4.—The Courier's special cable from London this morning says: There is no cessation in the hurried naval preparations which have been under way for more than a week, and it becomes more than ever evident that Great Britain is preparing for one grand coup which shall settle once and for all some of the perplexing questions which have beset the government for years past. That the question of the "open door" in China and the limitation of the Russian advance into Manchuria is to be one of these there is little doubt; but it is also apparent that Lord Salisbury and his colleagues have decided upon the time is opportune for the definite settlement of the Egyptian question, which is becoming embarrassing by reason not only of the Russian occupation of Fashoda, but through the intrigues of the young khedive, who is chafing at the restraint put upon him
