# Many Emigrants

There Will Be a Boom in Emigration This Summer.

Lord Strathcona Seems to Have Been

Doing Good Service in London. London, March 5.-Emigration to Canada bids fair to receive a decided boom during the coming spring and summer. The officers of the Canadian commission on Victoria street have been fairly inundated during the past few weeks with letters from different parts of the country seeking informa-tion concerning desirable points of settlement in the Dominion, rates of fare and other particulars.

This revival of interest concerning the Dominion on the part of people anxious to leave the mother country and find a new home is doubtless due in a measure to a letter recently addressed to the mayors of the leading cities; and also widely circulated through labor and trades union channels. In this letter Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the high commissioner for Canada, sets forth that the Canadians are much gratified at the increasing interest shown by the United Kingdom in their affairs, and that they hope to see an influx of British settlers and capital to cultivate the large areas of fertile vacant land in the

The high commissioner goes on to point out that people with capital for investment, farmers, farm laborers and domestic servants will be heartily welcomed by the Canadians. Domestic servants, he says, are especially greatly needed, farm laborers can rely upon getting employment at remunerative wages, while farmers can obtain free grants of land or crown grants of most fertile soil at low prices.

# Election Returns.

None of the Official Declarations Affect the Government Majority.

Bitter Feeling in Ottawa Over the Slaughter of Slattery.

Big Majorities Recorded for Liberal Candidates.

AT OTTAWA

Ottawa, earch 5.—The fact that one Conservative candidate in this city managed to squeeze in by a vote or two, and may yet be replaced by a Liberal on a scrutiny, does not agitate a large section of the capital half as much as the revelation of how the other Conservative nominee was slaughtered in the house of his friends. Mr. Matter tery was put up by the Conservatives, along with Mr. Powell. Mr. Powell was a strong Protestant, and Mr. Slattery, an equally strong Catholic. At the close of the polls it was found that Mr. Powell had been given 591 votes more than Mr. Slattery, many of them "plumpers." The Journal says that "the discrimination seems to indicate the existence in the city of a leaven of unintelligent narrow-mindedness among some Protestants which the great majority of their fellows must heartily condemn." The resentment against the slaughtering of Mr. Slattery is now very great, and it will be many a long before any similar combination will be joined in by the Catholics of

HOW IT WAS DONE. In East Simcoe, the Conservative candidate was elected by 27 in a threecornered contest. The Patron candidate, Train, polled 545 votes, all Liberal Patrons. The defeat of Patrons by Conservatives in every constituency where the fight was single-handed shows that the Conservative Patrons very generally deserted and returned to their old CHANGES BY OFFICIAL COUNTS.

The changes made by the official figures from many constituencies yesterday were for the most part unimportant and failed to affect the standing of the parties as announces by The Advertiser for several days past, viz., government 49, opposition 43, Patron 1, vacant 1; total 94. Yesterday at the parliament buildings Mr. Tucker declared that he was still an independent, and it is altogether likely that he will give Mr. Hardy as fair a measure of support as Mr. Whitney. But the government can do without his vote if he were to choose to go over permanently to the opposition. One by one the ridings announced as doubtful, or likely to go Conservative, fall into line and are officially announced as Liberal. This was the case yesterday in West Elgin, as already reported. Manitoulin Island, which the Conservatives were willing to bet would elect Dr. Fell in East Algoma, gave the doctor only 36 majority, and Mr. Farwell's majority is 224, allowing for the Island. Mr. Conmee's election is also assured in West Algoma, and once more Conservative hopes are dashed.


