

FOCH NOW PLANNING **COUNTER STROKE TO** SMASH THE ENEMY

No Position Yielded Until the Enemy Has Paid Price.

IS AIMING AT DECISION

Bad Appearance of News Does Not Reveal True Significance.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, April 16 .- Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.-The enemy is continuing his forcing tactics and is employing large masses of fresh troops. Since the opening of the western offensive the enemy has thrown in one hundred and twenty divisions, of which many have been thrown in two and even three times. Since the fall of Bailleul the Germans have been fighting up to Ravelsberg. Up to the present, however, he has only advanced a fed hundred yards.

Today's news is not so good as one could wish, but the following viewpoint is suggested:

We are confronted by enormous concentrations of men and guns. The purpose of the enemy has been revealed as an operation attempting to separate the Anglo-French armies by rushing on the former. Gen. Foch, in closest agreement with Gen. Haig, is aiming not only at arresting the enemy, but at a counterattack which shall defeat the Germans. Therefore, within certain limits, the sound policy is to allow the Germans to spend their surplus power as lavishly

evacuated.

It must be remembered that Gen. von Ludendorff has laid down all his cards, while Gen. Foch has not yet shown his hand. I know that Gen. Foch's disposition inspires a degree of confidence which the situation in Flanders seemingly does not justify. We may rest assured that our own supreme command is watching both the enemy and the map

watching both the enemy and the map with intense vigilance.

Enemy Checkmated So Far.

While the enemy hopes to frustrate our plans by forcing changes by weight of numbers, so far the incomparable steadfastness of our soldiers has deprived the enemy of the fruits of his schemes. The latest report is that the enemy has carried Wytschaete and established himself in Spanbroekmolen. Therefore, although we are upon the slopes of Messines Ridge, the greater part of the ridge is in the enemy's hands.

The enemy is attacking hard in the direction of Meteren, and the situation there is obscured. there is obscure.

From La Bassee to Robeck the Germans are again shelling our lines. At Boyelle and south towards Arras the enemy gained a footing in our trench system, but a counter-attack drove him out.

INDORSE PRINCIPLES OF BANKRUPTCY ACT, BUT DESIRE SOME CHANGES

Retail Merchants Meet Special Committee to Press Claims.

Ottawa, April 17.-Indorsation of the principles underlying the drafting of the bankruptcy act, which was introduced in the House by S. W. Jacobs. Montreal, was made this morning at a meeting of the special committee, by a delegation representing the retail merchants of the dominion.

Members from each of the provincial associations were present.

While the merchants believed that legislation of the character proposed would be beneficial, they were of the opinion that the wholesale merchants would, under the bill as it now stands, receive greater consideration. They urged that retailers were not sufficiently protected and suggested amendments in this connection.

Claiming that all professional men and even farmers should come under the provisions of the act, they declared that "legislation of this nature should not be limited in scope or confined to any class, or recognize any misdemeanor, but it should be wide enough to embrace all classes and conditions of men. meeting of the special committee, by a




