

Concerning the new regulations of his dealer last April to supply him with the fuel controller announced today. W. A. Marin of the D. L. & W. Coal Company said: "Such regulations should have been in force three months ago, away back in June or July in order to have the desired effect on the coal situation. It is rather late in the day, now that 60 or 65 per cent, of London's fuel supply for the winter has been delivered to consumers. "Again, since the regulations are just about three months late, they should go into force at once or they will complicate the situation rather than otherwise. If a period of time is allowed until the 21st of November before the regulations become law the natural thing to expect is that the coal dealers will be swamped with orders in the meantime. This will mean that they will be obliged to go to the smaller American jobbers in order to meet the demands on them and probably an advance in the price of coal.
