The present German Government means well and has no illusions as to the position in which Germany finds herself. I have a distinct impression that they are entitled to a 1ew grains of encouragement. Meets Discouragement.

Outside of Government circles a man coming to Germany willing to find whatever merit there is meets discouragement on every hand. Naturally, he forms acquaintances among people connected one way or another with the old regime, and most of them have not taken to heart the lessons of the war. With few exceptions, men of higher class with whom I talked were full of schemes for getting together with the Allies on a basis of equality. Their argument for the other countries immediately joining Germany in business relations was pressed home on the plea of allied self-interest. Of course, there is ground for this argument, but no German can be very convincing in any plea for the welfare and prosperity of ailied peoples. I had a talk with one of the foremost men of the old regime, and he spent half an hour abusing President Wilson for his "betrayal" of Germany. Finally I could stand it no longer, and told him that if he thought a man who had played a part in the launching and conduct of the late war could lecture Americans on the subject of honor, he was very much mistaken ould lecture Americans on the subject of honor, he was very much mistaken. Men of this stamp in Germany may not constitute a large class, but they have the floor, and their capacity for keeping dislike and hatred of Germany alive is indefinite.


