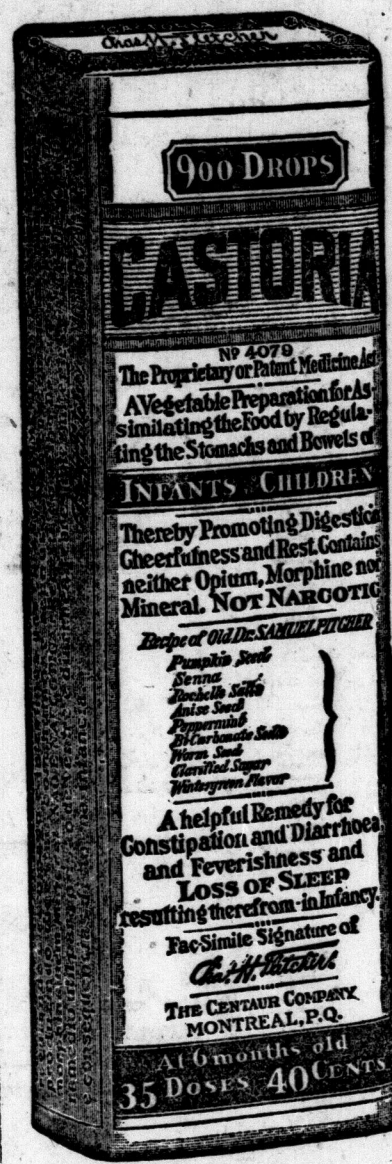

MINERS' DISPUTE MORE HOPEFUL**Another Meeting of Triple Alliance To Be Held Today To
Receive Reply of Lloyd George To Proposals Made At
Yesterday's Conference—Robert Smillie Says In-
creased Output Depends On Securing Goodwill of the
Miners—Railwaymen and Transport Workers Consider
Miners Have Made Good Case For Increase.[Associated Press.]
London, Sept. 22.—No progress was
made today toward a settlement of
the coal miners' dispute, although among
the more optimistic hope has been re-
vived that a meeting of the "Triple
Alliance" has been called for Thurs-
day to hear the reply of Premier Lloyd
George to the committee of the alli-
ance, which visited him late today.
Premier Reiterates Proposal.
The reply of the premier was a reitera-
tion of the proposal made to the
miners' executive committee the pre-
vious day, that, there being a differ-
ence of opinion between the miners and
the Government as to facts and figures,
the question of an increase in wages
should be referred to an impartial tri-
bunal, or, alternately, the miners would
consent to work out with the colliery
proprietors and the Government some
scheme whereby in return for increased
production the miners could get in-
creased wages.The premier considered that by the
alternative proposal the miners would
get a greater increase than they de-
manded, while the country also would
benefit.Must Have the Goodwill.
To this Robert Smillie, the miners'
leader, replied:
"We are as anxious as you to increasethe output, but you can only get that
if you have the goodwill and desire to
increase it."In opening the conference with the
premier, Mr. Smillie pressed the pe-
cuniary necessities of the miners, being
conceded if the miners were to maintain
the standard of life which all desired they
should. James Henry Thomas, for the
railwaymen, and Harry Goslin, for the
transport workers, announced that their
unions were in full sympathy with the
miners, who they considered had made
out their case for an increase.Advance Should Be Granted.
In a further reply to the premier Mr.
Smillie said that the colliery owners
had expressed the view that the ad-
vance should be granted, and that the
committee's good will would set up
every promise of an increased output,
which they would work for. It was not
the power, however, to give a
definite pledge for an increased output
as obstacles might be placed in their
way.Frank Hodges, another of the miners'
delegates, said that the proposition as
it now stood was one which could not
take the place of application for an
advance. After the conference the
"Triple Alliance" committee met and
decided to call a full meeting of the
three organizations for Thursday.**TAFT, VALUATOR

SALORS, STOKERS, COOKS,
FAVORS CONCILIATION BD.**Men Ask 25 Per Cent Wage Increase
and 28-Day Month.MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—It was an-
nounced today at the offices of the
union of sailors, stokers and cooks of
vessels engaged in inland navigation
that a referendum among members of
the union throughout Canada on the
subject of the men's wage demands
had been taken and was in favor of
the appointment of a board of con-
ciliation. Members are in favor of a
strike if no settlement can be affected
by such board.The men are asking an increase of
25 per cent, and want the month
reckoned at 28 days, instead of 30 and
31, as at present.**ONE KILLED AND ONE
INJURED IN CRASH**OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—A. G. Amey, a
jeweler of Shawville, Quebec, was
killed and Lieut. Jack Drummond of
Ottawa painfully injured this after-
noon when, in full view of hundreds
of spectators, the aeroplane in which
they were flying crashed to the earth.
Drummond was taking up passengers
for ten-minute flights, and when the
accident happened was attempting a
spiral nose dive.ARMED RAID ON BANK.
