SENSATION IN IRISH SALOONS AT TIMBER PROBE

PEOPLE WANT NEW CITY HALL ON FEDERAL SQUARE ANY OTHER PLACE ILLEGAL

"Father of Federal Square" Plan Says Injunction To Stop Building On Present Site Is Contemplated—Citizens' Wishes Should Be Carried Out.

Reports that an injunction will be sought to prevent the use of funds voted for federal square purposes to erect city offices on the present site were further strengthened today, when Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles stated that action of this kind was contemplated. It was largely through his efforts that the federal square scheme was adopted in 1912, and he is anxious to see the wishes of the people carried out as expressed on that occasion.

Diverting funds voted for that purpose to the erection of a temporary office building is illegal, in his opinion, and can be stopped by the courts. The funds, he pointed out, were accumulated in the following manner: \$100,000 was acquired by the sale of the old city hall; \$25,000 for a new hall was voted by the council in 1912, and in 1913 the federal square vote added another \$25,000 to be used in the erection of buildings on the federal square site. COLD WAVE IS MOVING EASTWARD

Toronto, Jan. 18.—Canadian Press.—White River, Ont., which generally holds the record as the coldest point on the official weather map of Canada, has not reported its mercury standing this morning to the meteorological observatory, but a minimum of 25 below at Ironsides, Ont., and 25 below at Cheltenham, Ont., are unofficially reported to Canadian Press, limited, from the north coast. All Canada, except the Pacific and Atlantic provinces, is under a grip of zero weather. The lowest officially reported to the observatory at 8 o'clock today, being at Ottawa, where the thermometer registered 18 below. At Winnipeg it is 22 below, and at Montreal 22 below. At that point yesterday the cold wave was moving eastward.

Will Get It Right If Enough Trials Made

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Jan. 18.—There has been considerable confusion regarding the proclamation summoning Parliament. At first it was decided to open the session on February 16, and a small issue of the Canada Gazette was printed to this effect. The issue was destroyed, and the date changed to the 11th. In the new proclamation there has been a peculiar omission. The House of Commons is summoned to meet, but no mention is made of the Senate. As a consequence the new issue of the Gazette, which has been freely circulated, will be suppressed, and a new proclamation, in which both Houses of Parliament will be summoned, will be issued today.

LONDON ALDERMEN MAY BE PAID FOR THEIR SERVICES

Ald. John Ashton Will Bring In Resolution at Next Council Meeting—Windsor Daddies Receive \$5 Per Meeting.

London aldermen may follow the lead of their Windsor colleagues, and vote themselves an indemnity of \$5 each for every council meeting they attend. Ald. John Ashton will introduce a motion to this effect at the next regular council meeting. It is possible that he will name a more modest sum than \$5.

JAPAN AWAITS BRITISH-U. S. NAVAL HOLIDAY

Tokio Government Claims That America Furthering Own Interests Only.

Tokio, Jan. 17.—Proposals emanating from the United States that Japan, Great Britain and the United States "take a naval holiday" is a subject that despite the fabulous riches of the United States, she wishes to curtail national expenditures, and therefore the proposals are intended more to help the peace of the world than to contribute to the peace of the world.

UNITED FARMERS OF ALBERTA NOT TO ENTER PROVINCIAL POLITICS

Edmonton, Jan. 18.—Approximately 1,500 delegates from all parts of the province are in the city to attend the annual convention of the United Farmers of Alberta, which meets here all week, commencing today.

The most important matter scheduled for consideration is the proposed co-operative selling plan for wheat and grain products of the three Western Provinces. Considerable opposition to the wheat pool is said to exist among the members of the association, and although President H. W. Wood, in his address, will urge the approval of the principle, and the board of directors' report is favorable, it is expected that there will be considerable discussion. More than two hundred resolutions will be considered by the convention. The United Farm Women of Alberta are holding sessions at the same time, and will meet each evening with the men.

According to present plans, the association will not even consider officially entering provincial politics as a body.

In federal politics the organization has already completed a working plan, and it is expected that the leadership of Hon. T. A. Cregar will be endorsed. He will speak on Wednesday night.

Dog Is Convicted of Sheep Slaughter, Sentence Suspended

Winchester, Ky., Jan. 18.—"Old King," a foxhound owned by Frank Jones, was convicted of sheep slaughter by County Judge W. Lee Evans yesterday. Conviction for this offense usually means death, but Judge Evans has promised to withhold sentence if Jones will send the dog away from the county. Two puppy sons of the hound were exonerated.
