THE BERTHS ALLOTTED

Board of Works Arranges Accommodation for Steamship Men at Sand Point for this Winter.

The steamship companies have signed the agreement to the new schedule of charges, and the board of works yesterday allotted the warehouses at Sand Point. The C. P. R. have Nos. 1 and 3, the Allan line No. 2, and the Donaldson line No. 4. It is understood that other lines will use the C. P. R. wharf when vacant. Tenders were opened for steam heating the warehouse, but not awarded, as the conditions were not complied with. Several other matters were dealt with. Ald. Christie occupied the chair, and the full board was present, with the addition of the mayor and harbor master, common clerk and the recorder were in attendance.

Robert Thomson, William Downie, J. N. Suberland and Harold Schofield attended with reference to the allotment of the warehouses on the west side. A letter from Wm. Thomson & Co. was read, stating that they had signed the agreement as drawn, and asking if any lower rates were granted to other companies they should receive equal benefit. Ald. MacRae drew attention to two lines in the schedule—five cents a ton for timber and ten cents for lumber, and mentioned that the C. P. R. desired the rates reduced to four cents and eight cents respectively to correspond with the rates in Montreal and avoid mistakes. He estimated that the income would not be reduced by more than \$100 by the change.

A letter from the shipping federation was read. The communication referred to the new charges as apparently a backward movement and as imposing a heavy tax on the vessels to this port as against Halifax, Portland and Boston. Reconsideration was asked for and it was urged that the new schedule was contrary to the understanding come to last spring, when the mayor and others had an interview with the members of the federation. The same was about to be raised by the city appeared to be in excess of the interest and sinking fund as it was understood not to include previous expenditure. Notwithstanding the increased expenditure to the companies there was no better accommodation. A committee of the board was appointed to see that the new schedule was carried out. The letter was signed by H. & A. Allan, R. Ford & Co., Ltd., and the agents for the Manchester, South African, Head and Harrow lines.

The mayor said the meeting in Montreal was quite informal and the president of the board of trade and himself had only endeavored to place the situation before the representatives. While the new wharf had not been constructed, the council had used every effort by calling for a vote. He did not regard the charges as excessive. Ald. Baxter thought a meeting would be an advantage to settle any misunderstanding. He moved that an opportunity be given the representatives of the steamship companies to discuss any unsatisfactory questions. Mr. Downie said he was awaiting the document. He had only one suggestion which was forwarded to Montreal. He was prepared to sign a similar agreement to that signed by the other companies. The recorder said the C. P. R. agreement differed in some respects, as it was necessary to provide for payment of the cost of the wharf which did not actually go into the warehouse, and to arrange that the company should only be charged on what they carried themselves. Ald. MacRae moved that the agreement with the C. P. R. be ratified and signed. This was carried.

Mr. Downie then signed the agreement. The matter of allotting the berths was taken up. The C. P. R. applied for Nos. 1 and 3. A letter from Mr. Downie was read, in which he mentioned that there would be ten additional sailings to London this season and more business than last. His company offered to provide accommodation for the members of the South African and Head lines at the wharves if allotted them. The C. P. R. submitted a statement showing they carried more freight last year than all the other companies together, as follows:

Mr. Thomson & Co. asked for No. 2 for the Allan line, and offered to arrange with the C. P. R. to use No. 1 for the Manchester, South African, Head and Harrow lines. Mr. Thomson mentioned that if accommodation could be found his firm might arrange for the Cuban-Mexican service of the Elder Dempster line.

Ald. MacRae moved that the C. P. R. be given warehouses Nos. 1 and 3, the Allan line No. 2, and the Donaldson line No. 4. He hoped that there would be every endeavor to make the best arrangement with other lines. The motion was carried.

Mr. Downie said it was in his company's interest to handle as much freight as possible and secured the board no obstacle would be raised.

Mr. Thomson drew attention to the Elder-Dempster line being shut out. He wished the matter had been left to the harbor master as was done last year.

Ald. MacRae said as a matter of law the harbor master could put a steamer anywhere he liked.

Mr. Thomson was informed that the C. P. R. could not lock up their warehouse or refuse goods admittance as they had no exclusive right.

In reply to the chairman, the recorder said whatever vessel occupied the wharf would pay the top wharfage.

Mr. Sutherland asked if the C. P. R. boat must lie in the stream if her berth was occupied.

Ald. Baxter said the harbor master would see his decision.

The motion to hear the steamship representatives was carried with the addition that the meeting be called for Friday week. The deputation then withdrew.
