Mills and Mrs. Roesbach, the dead man's
sisters; Mrs. Smith's sister, Mrs. Anthony Drexel, of Philadelphia, and Eugene
Zimmerman. Mr. Smith's mother, who is
aged and infirm, was unable to come east
to attend the obsequies.

The casket of mahogany was covered
completely with orchids and other flowers.

As the procession reached the corner of Fifth avenue and Twenty-ninth street, Oliver H. Aldred, a son of Sexton Aldred of St. Bartholomew's, who was riding with the driver, heard shouts from the cross street, and, turning saw a runaway horse coming toward him at full gallop.

Mrs. Smith, in the next carriage, thrust the curtains aside and saw the danger. She screamed. 
"You must stand back, brothers," he said. "This is no show."
