## BASE RUNNING IS IMPORTANT

Managers Should Not Belittle Important Feature of Game

Once again it is necessary to revert to the Boston Braves' base-stealing record for the season and its significance, says a Philadelphia baseball expert. Because the Braves stole only 139 bases for the season, and won the pennant, the fans are figuring that base stealing is an aid to winning ball games has been greatly over-estimated. Managers are about ready to "can" the base-running game as a result of this revelation. But both fans and managers should go slowly in throwing base running into the discard, pennant or no pennant.

The Braves played a different sort of game because they had different material than the other clubs. The Braves were content to make a run at a time, using the sacrifice when necessary, and they could afford to do this because they possessed pitchers who were able to hold the opposition to low scores. The Braves were able to win games with one, two or three runs, and did not try to make them in clusters.

McGraw, with his Giants, was up against a different proposition. His pitchers could not hold the enemy to a few runs, and in order to win, he had to make runs in bunches. He had to have four or five or more in the game at all. So the base-running game was adopted, the hit and run and the steal. If successful, usually produced two or three runs at a time. Stallings is not a manager to be trifled with. His players do not care to try for a stolen base and fail. It means some hard words for them, and Stallings had a different kind of campaign mapped out. He was willing to try for one run at a time, and with his excellent pitching and fine defensive team, he was able to get away with it. So do not belittle base running. It is one of the fine arts of the game.

## HINTS FOR THE COOK

**Not Bread.**  
One pint of water, half yeast cake, one tablespoon salt, two cups of rolled oats, half cup molasses, two tablespoons lard, four to make stiff (one quart) one pound cut up walnuts. Set over night as any bread.

**Chocolate Custard**  
Cook 4 teaspoons cocoa in ½ cup hot water till thick, then add 4 cups hot milk. Pour in 2 well beaten eggs and stir well. Strain into a pudding dish and steam 20 minutes. Serve with whipped cream piled on top, sweetened and flavored. One cup sugar should be added to the custard.

**Delicious Dark Pudding**  
One-half cup molasses, one-half cup of brown sugar, one-half cup of sour milk, one-third cup of melted butter, one egg, one-half teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon of baking powder, one teaspoon cinnamon, ½ teaspoon of cloves, a little nutmeg, one-half cup of walnut meats cut in small pieces, one cup of chopped raisins, one cup of currants, one quarter pound of citron cut in small slices, two cups of sifted flour. Steam two or three hours, then put it into the oven to dry. Steam it in a three-pint pail.

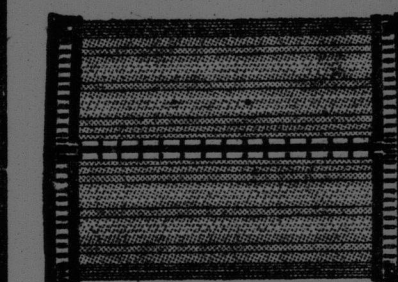

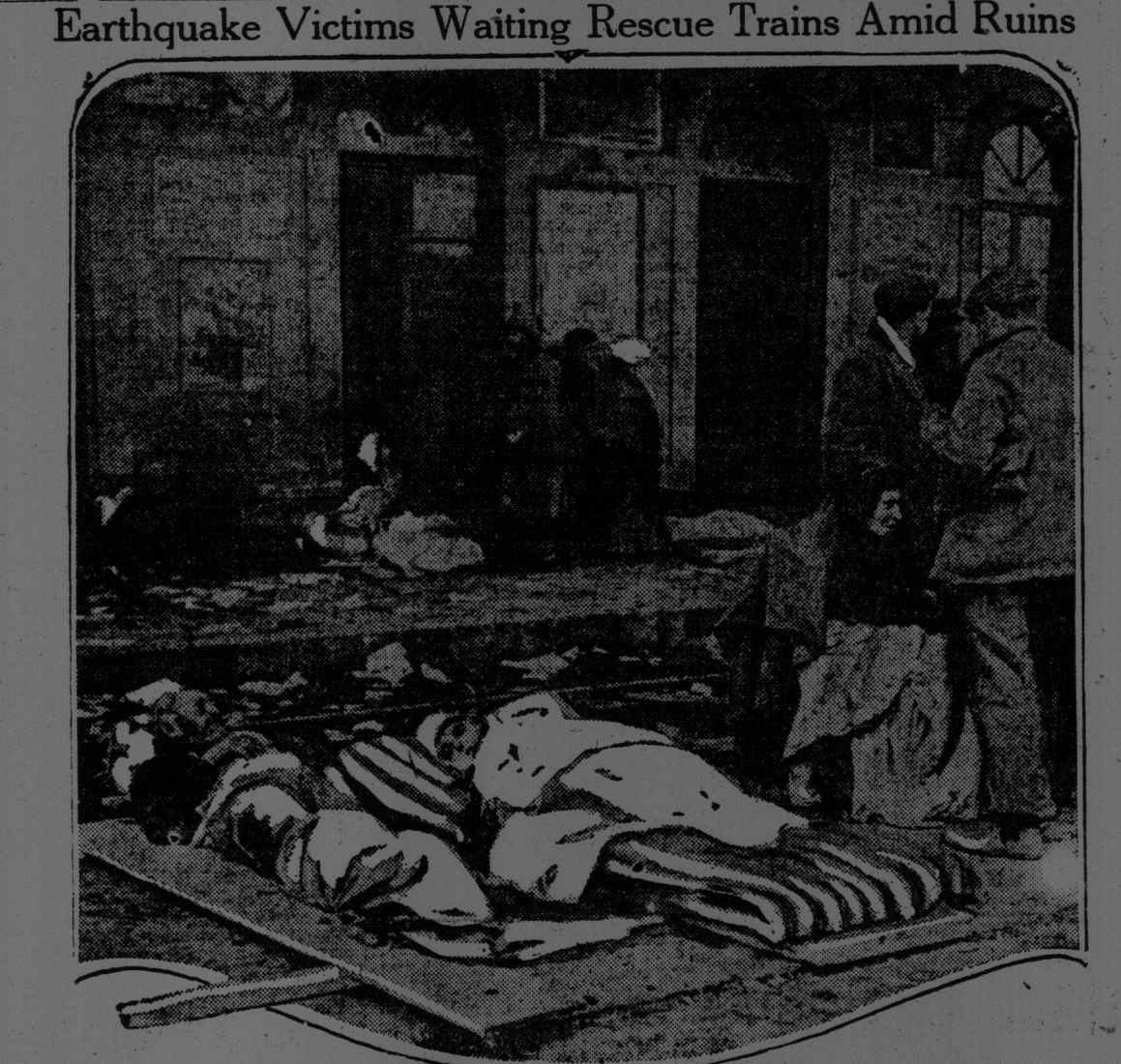

## ELIOT SEES NO ROAD TO PEACE IN RELIGION

Only Hope, He Says, Is in Law and Faith Keeping Nations.

"Roads to Peace," is the title of an article by President Emeritus Charles W. Eliott of Harvard in The Cosmopolitan, a monthly publication connected with the activities of the allied Cosmopolitan Clubs of the American colleges. The article and others, Prof. Hugo Münsterberg and Prof. Anesaki were obtained by Alexis J. Kraachmakoff, a Harvard junior. Mr. Kraachmakoff shortly afterward received notice that he must join the Russian army and he left recently for the fighting zone. Dr. Eliott in his article says in part:

"The existing roads toward peace are not short, but long and arduous. What ever increases the general intelligence and mutual understanding of neighboring peoples will promote peace between them, if other conditions are favorable so that universal elementary education on the whole leads toward peace, in spite of the fact that some of the best educated nations today are also highly beligerent."

Constitutional government, liberty of association, and good courts all tend toward peace, Dr. Eliott says. Then he continues:

"The various roads all lead to a slow, gradual amelioration of the condition of the human race. Must we await the completion of this slow process before we can expect the advent of universal peace? Is there no shorter road? If there be any shorter road, it must lie through the region of ethics."

"For nineteen hundred years," Dr. Eliott continues, "the ethics of Jesus of Nazareth have been in the world, but have had no effect to prevent or even reduce the evils of war, the greatest of the evils which afflict mankind. The ethical doctrines of Christianity in regard to justice, humility and mercy have not found expression in the relations between Christian nations, whether in peace or at war, or indeed in the history of institutional Christianity itself. At this moment none of the Christian churches has had any influence to prevent the catastrophe which has overtaken Europe."

"They are all alike in this respect—Greek, Roman, Lutheran, and Anglican. Each national church supports the National government, and every ruler is as 1850.
