Goulding Wins.

George Goulding, of Toronto, Canadian-American champion walker, won a special three-mile walk in twenty minutes 58-3 seconds at the annual indoor meet of the New York Amateur Athletic Club at Madison Square Garden on Wednesday night. Last week in Buffalo, Goulding made a record for the world's twenty minutes 42 seconds. On Wednesday night Goulding walked against Remer, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, and E. Rens, American champion, of the Mohawk Club. Each man walked one and a half miles against Goulding. At the end of the first relay Goulding was eighty-eight yards ahead of Remer, but in the second relay Rens gained forty-eight yards.

Famous Runner Retires.

New York, Feb. 12.—Melvin W. Sheppard, probably the greatest middle distance runner ever developed in America, announced on Thursday night his retirement from competition as the result of injuries sustained while running at the N. Y. A. C. games at Madison Square Garden on Wednesday night. Sheppard was painfully injured while competing in a 800 yard race, crashing into a board fence, which tore his right arm above the elbow. He also cut around the legs and splinters penetrated his arm.

FOR HIS AMBITION

Kaiser's Losses To Present 1,333,500

THIRD OF HIS FORCES

By End of Another Six Months, if Ratio is Continued, the Figures Will be Appalling—The British Losses

(Toronto Globe.)

Mr. Asquith's announcement in the commons yesterday that the British losses in the western area of the war—that is, in France and Belgium—total 104,000 officers and men gives some indication of the terrible nature of the struggle. Some interesting figures from the United States ambassador to Berlin have also been made public regarding the losses of the Prussian army. Up to January 8 they were 128,000 killed, 974,000 wounded and 102,000 missing, of whom the bulk are prisoners of war. If we divide these figures by five we secure a monthly average of 25,600 killed, 194,800 wounded and 20,400 missing. Adding a month's average losses thus ascertained to the Berlin figures as published up to January 8, we find that the losses up to the present time of the Prussians and Bavarians are 153,600 dead, 688,000 wounded and 124,800 missing.

The Saxons, Bavarians and Wurtembergers have their own casualty lists, and of their totals no accurate record is available. The Bavarians are known to have suffered fearfully on the Yser and around Ypres, and their losses have been far higher proportionately than those of the troops whose casualties are recorded in the Berlin lists. The aggregate population of Bavaria, Saxony, and Wurtemberg is a little under a fourth of that of the states of the empire which report their losses through Berlin. If, therefore, we add a fourth only to the losses arrived at from Ambassador Gerard's figures it would seem that the German losses up to the present are 228,000 killed, 812,000 wounded and 249,600 missing, or a total of 1,289,600.

The German army actively engaged in warfare was recently stated by Colonel Repington, the well-informed military correspondent of The London Times, to be 4,000,000 men. It would seem, therefore, that a third of Germany's total strength on the battlefield has been put out of action in six months. Carrying forward the same standard of comparison to the coming six months, when Germany will have to call to the colors every man of the eight million available males of service age within the empire, we find that the loss of a third of the troops whose casualties are recorded in the Berlin lists. The aggregate population of Bavaria, Saxony, and Wurtemberg is a little under a fourth of that of the states of the empire which report their losses through Berlin. If, therefore, we add a fourth only to the losses arrived at from Ambassador Gerard's figures it would seem that the German losses up to the present are 228,000 killed, 812,000 wounded and 249,600 missing, or a total of 1,289,600.

Hon. Mr. Asquith announced in the British Commons yesterday that of the 104,000, approximately 25 per cent of the wounded had recovered and were fit for service.
