BERLIN RADIO TOWER OPENED WITH CEREMONY

**Programmes Will Be Broad-
cast From There During
Winter Season**

BERLIN, Sept. 28.—With music and due ceremony there has recently been brought into operation the new "Radio Tower" of Berlin's broadcasting station. This is perhaps, the most remarkable structure associated with "wireless" in the world.

Built of very light steel bars, it is about 450 feet high. At the top is a "look-out gallery, and immediately underneath is a square room with sides of glass and appointments, including a bar of that very anti-prohibitionist type paradoxically known as "America" in Continental cities.

RESTAURANT PROVIDES
Lower down, but still about 200 feet above the ground, is a restaurant. This has accommodations for 200 people and is an integral part of the tower. A lift travels right up to the top, and for those who prefer a "look-out" exterior staircase, an interior ladder, for use in emergency, has 650 rungs.

So light is the steelwork of the tower that its total weight, restaurant, gallery and all, is only 400 tons, and it is on a foundation of thin porcelain plates.

PLANS FOR WINTER
Adjoining the tower are studios, large enough for the assembly of a full symphony orchestra, operatic company and chorus.

During the next winter season there will be broadcast from the tower itself 20 operas, several musical comedies and a succession of plays, designed to illustrate the development

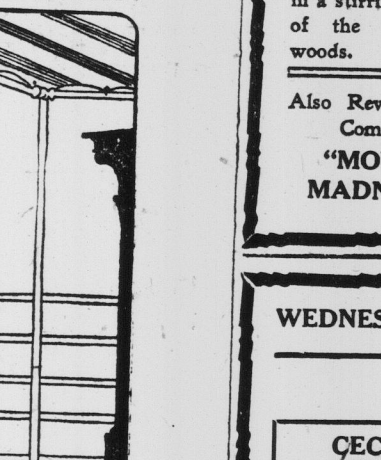
