Inability to secure insurance against adverse weather conditions has caused a collapse in negotiations to bring here "Babe" Ruth, the home run king of the New York Americans and one of the outstanding stars in the recent world series games. Negotiations had been underway for some time to bring the Big Bambino here on Tuesday next and enable the Saint John fans to see Ruth, who is probably the most colorful baseball player of all time, in action on a local diamond. If those who were working on the project could have been assured of favorable weather Ruth undoubtedly would have ome here, but as the season is so late and the chances of suitable weather uncertain, the local promoters could not afford to take the chance, as Ruth demanded a guarantee of \$1,000. Efforts were made to secure weather in surance and when these failed, negotiations fell through. A telegram to this effect was sent last night to Christie Wells, manager of Ruth.
