CRAIG SATISFIED BELFAST, Dec. 4.—Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier sent a mes-sage to the Ulster people last night, thanking them for their restraint and patience during a prolonged period of anxiety and suspense. "I am fully satisfied with the out-come of the negotiations," the premier said in his message. "The signatories to the agreement separated with cordial-ity which I sincerely trust may result in more friendly relations being per-manently maintained among all par-ties and cliques throughout Ireland." COSGRAVE HOPEFUL LONDON, Dec. 4.—President Cos-grave of the Free State cabinet, is quoted by the Daily Express, as having made the following declaration as he boarded the train for home last night; "I firmly believe we have found the only solution to a very difficult situa-tion to which all the government could have subscribed. It will tend more surely and more speedily, toward the ultimate political unity between the two sections of Ireland, than any other course which might have been adopted under the circumstances. 
