French Cabinet Acts.

PARIS, Dec. 24—The evacuation of the Cologne area of the German occupied region on January 10, as conditionally set by the Versailles peace treaty, is deemed impossible by the French Cabinet in view of the reports from the inter-allied military control commission. At this morning's cabinet meeting the ministers approved a memorandum in which the French government expressed this conclusion.






