"BLUE SKY" LAW CASE GONE INTO

Matter of Federal Charter and Validity of Act May Develop.

The first case arising out of the legislation enacted at the last session of the Legislature, known as the Sales of Securities Act and popularly known as the Blue Sky Law, came before the police court this morning, when E. J. O'Toole, laid information on behalf of the attorney-general and commenced prosecution of J. M. Queen, on the charge that he had sold in New Brunswick stock in the J. M. Queen Oil Company without authorization from the Board of Public Utilities, as required in the act.

Mr. O'Toole produced several witnesses who testified that they had purchased shares in the company and produced receipts for the same which they had paid, which were offered in evidence as stock certificates, subject to the objection of J. D. Lewin, who with N. Carter, appeared for Mr. Queen. Upon Mr. O'Toole's assertion that several material witnesses were not able to be present, the case was postponed until Friday morning at 11 o'clock.

TALK OVERDRAFT TO FINANCE COUNTY Committee in Session—Default of Some Taxpayers Declared Reason.

The finance committee of the municipal council is meeting this afternoon to discuss county finances. It is understood that owing to short collections of the 1923 taxes, there will not be enough money to carry on the work of the various institutions and arrangements will be made this afternoon to provide for an overdraft at the bank on January 15th. The sum of \$12,000 in the appropriation for default taxes of the year before this was cut out by the council and that with the default of this year has cut the receipts down considerably.

Snow, president of the court, which concluded its session about 1 o'clock. No information was given out concerning the finding of the court, which will be promulgated at a later date.

WORK IS BEGUN. Work on the foundation for the Loyalist marker monument was begun yesterday and this morning the first concrete was poured. It is expected this will be in position by the end of the week. The site chosen is just inside the grass plot in Market Square, at the northwest corner and the inscription will face Dock street.

ACTION FOR RENT IN COUNTY COURT

John O'Regan Sues William Webber—Latter Makes Counter Claim.

The case of John O'Regan against William Webber, a suit for rent, was opened before Judge Barry in the County Court this morning. W. M. Ryan appeared for the plaintiff, while J. F. H. Teed represented Mr. Webber. Mr. O'Regan testified on his own behalf and James H. Wilkes, contractor was called to substantiate the plaintiff's claim. Mr. Webber was the first witness for the defence and was on the stand under cross-examination when the court adjourned for lunch. The case is being tried before a jury. Mr. O'Regan claims \$117.50, representing a half-month's rent of a factory in Princess street at \$75 a month, and eight months rent for two garages at the rear of his house in Orange street at \$2 a month each. Mr. Webber has submitted a counter claim for six months' storage cost for his automobile at \$10 a month when he was compelled to store it elsewhere.

In his defence, Mr. Webber says that the plaintiff permitted him to leave machinery and goods in the factory after he had closed it on November 1 last year. Regarding the garages, he says that he rented them as part of the Orange street house for which he paid \$50 a month and he understood that this would cover rental of the garages. He also contends that he had access to the garages, as the usual entrance from Princess street had been blocked while the factory was being converted into a tenement and the alternate way opened from Orange street was inaccessible for automobiles.

TRAFFIC POLICE MUST HAVE SWAY

Magistrate Rules Auto Driver Not Excused for Not Understanding.

Because a driver of an automobile does not understand a signal given by a traffic policeman is no excuse for him continuing on without paying attention to it, according to a decision given by Magistrate Henderson in the police court this morning. He pointed out that there is no offence for a man stopping his automobile, but there is if he continues on and thus endangers the lives of pedestrians because of his failure to understand a signal. These comments were made by the magistrate during a case against Jeremiah Howe, reported for refusing to stop his automobile at the foot of King street when signalled by Traffic Policeman Young on November 10. The defendant pleaded not guilty and said he did not understand the signal. Policeman Young testified that the defendant travelled along Market Square and as some pedestrians were passing he gave the driver the signal to stop, but he paid no heed and continued up King street. As it was the defendant's first appearance after taking the circuit, Magistrate Henderson said he would not strike the full penalty \$10, but would fine Mr. Howe \$5.
