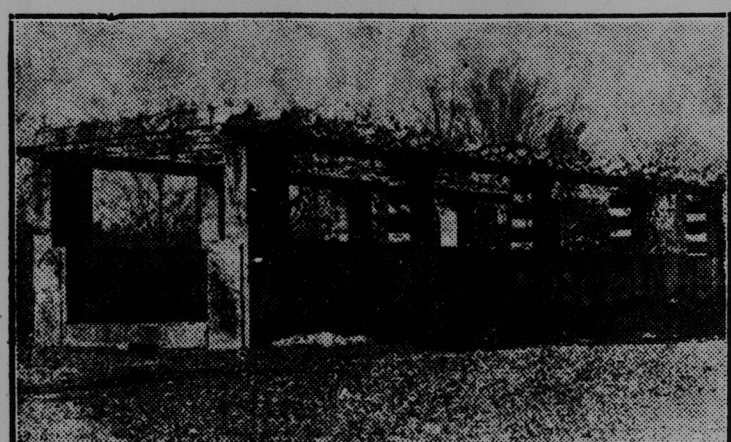

A UNIQUE MEMORIAL TO PIONEERS



Galt, Ontario, possesses a unique memorial in its foreground erected by the local daughters of the Empire to its pioneer dead. The old church, Kirkland, meaning The Church-in-the-Hill, was founded in 1832, but with its surrounding graveyard has gone into oblivion, the cemetery being converted into a park. Its old tombstones were disappearing when the D. O. E. stepped in and by careful search recovered them all and incorporated them into the fine pergola seen in the picture. It is now the pride of Galt.

YESTERDAY IN CITY CHURCHES

Rev. C. L. Whitman of the United African Mission, was the speaker last night at the Ludlow street Baptist church. He urged the pressing forward of missionary endeavour. Mrs. Whitman read the scripture and led in prayer.

HALIFAX NIGHT TRAIN RESTORED
