Built in 1820 and Still in Good Condition

Oak Hall Building, Corner King and Germain, Oldest Brick Building in the City—Has Interesting History.

The first brick building ever erected in St. John was known as the Disbrow building at Germain and Church streets. It was built in 1817, but was destroyed in the great fire of 1877. The second brick building was built about 1820 by James Scoullar at the corner of King and Germain streets. It is still standing in good condition, and today is commonly known as the Oak Hall corner. It was this building which stopped the big fire of 1849, when Charlotte street was wiped out, and King street down to this corner.

It is interesting to note that the first occupants of this building, nearly 100 years ago, were in the same business as Oak Hall—Tailors and Clothiers—and with the exception of a few years, this corner has continually housed a clothing business. Previous to Oak Hall's original entrance, the building was occupied by McCafferty and Daley, Dry Goods Merchants, and in 1889, Oak Hall took it over under the firm name of Scovill, Fraser & Co., but shortly afterwards, Messrs. Fraser were bought out, and the name of Scovill Brothers came into being.

Scovill Brothers' growing business forced them out of this building in 1916, when they erected and occupied their present store which is considered one of the finest of its kind in Canada. Once again Scovill Brothers are forced to look for additional floor space, and naturally they return to their old corner, which, in addition to their present building, will give ample room for expansion. Oak Hall intends to celebrate in some practical way their return to their old home and will make an announcement shortly that will be of great interest.
