GREAT SUCCESS OF SPENCER CONCERT

Very Large Audience in Opera House in Tribute to Poet—Excellent Programme Keenly Enjoyed

Great interest was shown in the Longfellow evening at the Opera House last night for the benefit of the aged St. John post, H. L. Spencer. The concert was under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club, of which Mrs. E. A. Smith is president. The evening's programme was made up of addresses on the poet Longfellow, by Mrs. Smith, musical selections of a very high order, and several very striking tableaux.

All the contributors were local people and their work was highly praised. Only in the case of an attraction at the theatre that is unique to the people come in such large numbers, the Opera House being crowded. The attention and hearty appreciation of the audience was much in evidence during the entire evening, and the programme, though long, was interesting from start to finish.

His Worship Mayor Frink presided and in opening the concert briefly referred to the object of the evening's entertainment. He told of the long and honorable association of Mr. Spencer with the press of the city, and spoke feelingly of the necessities that compelled the present assistance. Mrs. E. A. Smith was then introduced by his worship and opened the entertainment with two selections from Mr. Spencer's poems, which were heartily applauded by the audience. Mrs. Smith who had thoroughly mastered her subject, described in detail many of Longfellow's works, reading portions of them in a strikingly dramatic manner. She spoke of his visits abroad and their result on his work, and mentioned specifically many of the associations around which Longfellow had woven his poems.

The club was singularly happy in their music, which added much to the enjoyment of the evening. Miss Biederman, the piano soloist, Mrs. L. M. Curran, Mrs. A. Pierce, and Miss Biederman, Louise Knight, in a duet, Beware, Miss Thomson in the Day is Done and Mrs. Gordon in Dieu's Accompaniment, all did fine work, the sweet singing of Miss Knight and Mrs. Crockett in the duet, appealing specially to the audience. All the members were encored. The sextette from the Women's Canadian Club, was also praiseworthy and received loud applause.

Mrs. E. A. Smith received a beautiful bouquet of roses, with a card which simply said that it was from a number of friends in the audience, who admired and appreciated her spirit of sympathy and helpfulness toward others, and who derived great pleasure from lectures delivered for the benefit of worthy causes.

At the conclusion of the musical programme A. M. Belding thanked the audience on behalf of H. L. Spencer, and mentioned the poet's keen appreciation of the remembrance of the people of St. John for his work. He gave a few interesting details of Mr. Spencer's life, and some of the long associations which he had made and still retained after a long lifetime. Mr. Belding also acknowledged the work that had been done on behalf of the aged poet by the president and members of the Women's Canadian Club.

The third part of the programme consisted of several tableaux which portrayed scenes from Longfellow's poems. Careful attention had been paid to historical accuracy, the representations of the scenes being closely followed from the text. All the tableaux were good, the atmosphere of Hiawatha being especially so, while the representation of Miles Standish was another which seemed to accurately interpret Longfellow's immortal scene. Evangeline and the Spanish Student formed the balance.
