FORMER BASEBALL MAGNATE DEAD

Thos. Lynch Passed Away
—Was Former President
of National League.

New Britain, Conn., Mar. 1.—Thomas J. Lynch, former president of the National League Baseball Association, died recently in Hartford.

Death came at the Hartford Hospital following an illness of six weeks. Mr. Lynch was 65 years of age.

Mr. Lynch was the seventh president of the National League, was "one of the greatest umpires of all time and a fine executive," John A. Heydler, president of the league, declared. He characterized Mr. Lynch as "one of the big men of the game — courageous, fearless and honest."

Mr. Lynch served as president of the National League from 1910 to 1918, inclusive. He was elected to office as a compromise candidate, backed by John T. Brush, former president of the New York Giants, after the club owners were deadlocked on two original candidates, John M. Ward of New York and Robert Brown of Louisville.

Mr. Lynch first gained attention as an umpire in the old Eastern League and joined the National League's officiating staff in 1888, remaining with the senior circuit until 1899, when he retired until recalled to take the presidency.

Ten Things I Wish People Would Do

1. Make the policeman your confidant. Tell him your complaints promptly when these are important enough to deserve police attention.
2. If old people or young children in your family are apt to lose their way when out for a walk, be sure to have the name and address of such individuals written on a card and fastened in their clothing.
3. Provide yourself with a police whistle. Blowing the whistle will usually frighten away anyone attempting to molest you.
4. Remember that you must be reasonably suspicious, and not trust every prosperous-looking stranger. Up-to-date thieves don't look like thugs.
5. Make a memorandum of the case and movement number of your watch and of the serial number of your securities; make a description of all your valuables. This information is vital to the police when your property is lost or stolen.
6. When you close your house in summer, be sure to report the fact to the station house in your district. Take your valuables with you. Thieves can enter any house, no matter how well walled and locked, if they have time enough.
7. Storekeepers, registered, and valuable merchandise exposed to the plain view of the passing policeman. The store should be partially lighted.
8. Remember that when, upon leaving your house, you pull down the shades or leave a note in the door or letter box, saying you will be back at a certain hour, you may be giving valuable information to thieves.
9. Remember that if you hang expensive clothing or furs on the line for an airing and then go out and leave them, it is only your good luck if you find them there when you come back.

THE C. N. R. EXTENSIONS

(Toronto Globe.)

The Edmonton Bulletin suggests that the programme for branch lines for the National Railway System be cut in two when it is again presented to Parliament. It says that the chief objection made by the opposing Senators last year was that some of the branches planned in the Eastern Provinces were not really required. It goes on to say that the Western lines are necessary to give accommodation to the inhabitants, and also to justify the appeal to people in the Old Land to come and settle vacant land in Canada.

It would be neither good business nor common justice to invite inexperienced men from the other side of the ocean to homestead or buy farms far removed from existing railway lines unless they are given definite assurance of shipping facilities within two or three years at most. If there is little or no money in farming ten miles from a railway it is a delusion to suppose that the country can be made prosperous by inviting people unused to our climate and conditions to try to make a living on farms four or five or ten times that far from a railway. If we are to carry on an active immigration propaganda we are morally bound to accompany that with a policy of railway construction in the West.

The objection referred to was not the only one urged in the Senate. Sir James Lougheed, leader of the Opposition in the Senate, said that the bill proposed to hand over to the National Railway Board powers which have hitherto been exercised by Parliament, and that sufficient information had not been given to the Senate.
