

# LATEST FROM THE STATES.

BANGOR, July 14th.

New York news by express and telegraph states that the mob was undoubtedly concerted. All the labourers on the different railroads marching to the Provost Marshall's headquarters, 3d Avenue, 9th district, where drafting commenced.

All the conscription papers were destroyed and the buildings burnt, together with whole block.

Deputy Provost Marshall beaten to death. Police overpowered, and Superintendent Kennedy reported killed.

Inflicted rioters, women among them, demolished iron fences to arm themselves, and beat a dozen persons beyond recovery, murdered some twenty negroes, burnt coloured orphan Asylum, and committed other horrible outrages.

Detachment of soldiers preserved arsenal. Noon train from Boston was nearly demolished.

Military measures in progress, but supposed 150 would not be quelled before this morning. Mob estimated from 12,000 to 15,000.

Lee's lines reported covering Williamsport, and entrenched.

Growing belief that mass of army has crossed.

Gagetown.—MELANCHOLY TALE OF A MISSING MAN.—In the latter end of last week, this usually quiet place was disturbed from its peaceful propriety by the discovery near Musquash Island of a dead body, which has been identified as that of Mr. Alexander Anderson, blacksmith, of Oromocto. In the beginning of March last, Anderson, as it is stated, suddenly disappeared from Oromocto, where he left his wife and two young children; and the last account had of him living, was his having called at the hotel of Mrs. Glass, of Gagetown, late on an evening immediately after his disappearance from his home. He left Gagetown at a late hour, with intention to cross the St. John, in the direction of Grand Lake, when in his progress across the river, the unhappy man must have plunged into one of the numerous "air holes" in his route. From one of the steamers, in passing along on Friday last, his body fearfully disfigured was discovered floating on the surface of the water, and being secured, was conveyed to his family who during the whole time he was missing, thought him still alive, and in some of the Northern Provinces. The deceased was connected by marriage with a respected family in Oromocto, for whom much sympathy is felt by all who knew them.—*Id. Quarters.*

New Vessels.—The "Borderer" of 350 tons, called the "Albert J. Smith" was launched from the yard of Mr. Nehemiah Bennett, Hopewell, at Chatham, last Tuesday, from the yard of J. C. Gough, Esq., a handsome ship of 1,284 tons, called the "Mistress of the Seas." This vessel is built of the best materials and will class A.1 for 7 years. At Douglastown, on the 4th inst., from the yard of Messrs. Gilmour, Rankin & Co., a handsome bark of 490 tons, classed A.1 for 7 years, named the "Icon." Another vessel had been launched, from the yard of John Harley, Esq., Beaubair's Island, of which the Chatham "Times" had no particulars. From the yard of Mr. John McDonald, on Saturday night, a fine vessel of over 1000 tons was launched.—*Globe.*

A fine little girl, daughter of Joseph and Augusta Read of Oromocto, formerly of Sackville, was missed a few days ago, and after anxious and diligent search, the body was found next day at the bottom of the river, near the bridge.—*Sackville Borderer.*

Drowned.—On Saturday evening last, between the hours of eight and nine o'clock, a little girl aged about 10 years, daughter of Mr. Robert McLaren, fell off Trenton's wharf, and was drowned. The body was recovered about 11 o'clock.—*[News.]*

We notice by the Albion that the Honorable Thomas Baillie, for many years Surveyor General and Commissioner of Crown Lands in New Brunswick, died at Bangor-sur-mer, no date given. His annual pension of £500 sterling reverts to the Province.—*[Reporter.]*

Messrs. Olive, Carleton, launched from their yard yesterday, a splendid ship of about 1880 tons, named the "Gloucestershire." She will class A.1 for four years, and is a contract vessel intended for a British house.—*Globe.*

Sergeant Mathews, of the 15th Regiment, died in the hospital at Fredericton, on Tuesday afternoon, of a short illness.
