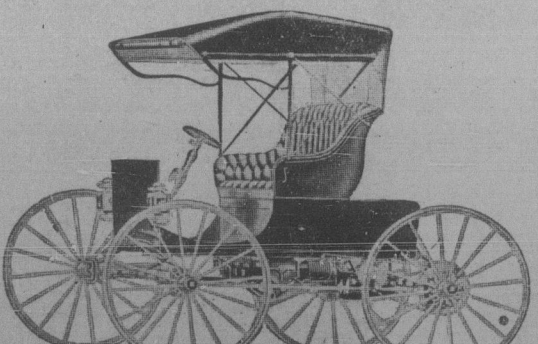

## REPUUDIATES REVOLUTION

New Carlist Pretender Will Have Nothing to Do With It.

Vienna, Aug. 4.—Don Jaime, the pretender to the Spanish throne, declares in an interview here that he has no intention of interfering in the present crisis in Spain and that his retirement to Froberg in Lower Austria, far from the Spanish frontier, is proof of his peaceful purposes.

"The Carlist party is a party of order," said Don Jaime. "I never will take upon myself to bring an entire people into danger for my own ends. Never will I lead Spaniards against Spanish soldiers. Should I return to Spain at the head of an army it will be only to restore order. This might be done."

## TROUBLE IN SWEDEN

Country Is on Eve of a Big Labor Struggle.

## HUNDRED THOUSAND IDLE

Impending Labor War Is Causing Consternation in Capital and Young Socialists Are Trying to Make a Revolution Out of It — Diet Moves to Stockholm and the Troops Are Called Out.

Stockholm, Aug. 4.—A labor war throughout Sweden, scheduled to begin to-day, threatens to develop in Stockholm into something approaching a miniature revolution.

The trouble will be enormously aggravated by the present general strike and lockout.

The members of the Young Socialists party are striving to give the movement a revolutionary character and the Government, warned that a political campaign is going on at the same time, has taken steps to nip expected disorders in the bud.

The authorities have decided, at the first signs of insurrection, to declare Stockholm in a state of siege. Soldiers are being quartered in different sections of the city and suburbs, and the entire standing army of Sweden is ready for eventualities.

King Gustav has summoned the members of Parliament to Stockholm, and a special session of the Riksdag is expected.

Great consternation prevails in the capital at these unexpected and dangerous developments in the situation. A civil guard corps is being organized for the protection of property, and the banks are closed and carefully guarded. All the ferries running out of Stockholm have ceased operations, and the large steamers engaged in the summer in carrying visitors and residents to the seaside resorts in the Archipelago have suddenly stopped running, discharging their crews, and are being laid up for the winter. This summer traffic is usually continued until the month of October.

It is expected that the present total of about 100,000 idleness will be largely increased by to-morrow. It is anticipated also that the curb and street car services in Stockholm will stop running Wednesday, and arrangements are being made to-day to run the waterworks and the electric light plants by soldiers.

The bridges leading to the islands adjacent to Stockholm are closely guarded. Many stores already have been closed as a no milk is being delivered in the city. The sale of spirits, beer and wine has been prohibited in both shops and restaurants.

The labor conflict that is at the bottom of this trouble originated in a dispute over wages in the woolen and cotton industries. In the beginning 13,000 men were locked out and other industries since have become involved, until to-day the employment of the country declared a lockout of the iron foundry hands, numbering about 30,000 men. A total of 80,000 men were reported locked out yesterday.

The employees of the Stockholm municipality and the state telegraph linemen have joined the strike movement, but the railwaymen's union have declined to do so.

## PATTI'S EARNINGS.

The Shrewd Financial Methods of the Musical Miracles.

Adelina Patti never suffered from the financial timidity of a Jenny Lind. Not only was she a supreme vocalist, but, as Colonel Mapleson remarked, "no one ever approached her in the art of obtaining from a manager the greatest possible sum he could by any possibility contrive to pay."

But the musical miracle was the spoiled darling of her day, and she never failed to obtain exactly what she wanted. She was first engaged in London in 1861 by Mapleson to sing four nights "on approval" and in case of success to obtain £40 a week. This contract was not fulfilled, however, for, being hard pressed financially, she had borrowed £50 from a rival manager, and her receipt proved practically a contract. This was the beginning of a career so dazzling that its successive steps are simply a series of increasing booknotes. In 1872 she obtained in London 200 guineas a night, since she insisted on having more than Christine Nilsson, who was receiving £200. She sang twice a week. Ten years later she was given \$5,000 a night! Her famous contract to sing in America provided that the money should be paid her at 2 o'clock on the day she sang; also a drawing room and sleeping car to be especially built for her, with conservatory, ferry, etc. Further, there was to be deposited to her credit \$50,000 for payment of the last ten performances—Patti's favorite device. She thus received about twenty times what Mario and Grisi got.

Her private car incidentally cost \$30,000 and contained a silver bath and gold keys to the doors, to say nothing of a \$2,000 piano. Patti gave to the manager only her voice and her costumes. Her drawing capacity justified this. "Lucia," as an example, was sung to an average of \$14,000. "Traviata" drew more, since she sang more notes. It was a frequent occurrence among the poorer music lovers to buy a club ticket and each take turns at hearing her for twenty minutes. If one oversteered his time he paid for the entire ticket. Some mathematicians computed by dividing the number of notes sung by the sum paid that in "Semiramide" Patti received 42c, cents for each note. This was found to be just 7-10 cents a note more than Rossini got for writing the whole opera.—George Middleton in Bookman.
