

"But in an infortunate hour, a majority of the Irish representatives, at the bidding of an English statesman, broke our ranks, abandoned the flag of independent opposition and ranged themselves as followers and satellites of the British statesman. We refused to become parties to the treason, relying upon the national conviction, and maintained intact the allegiance to the independent national party, in the conviction that the people would justify and support us.

"The great leader is dead, but the cause lives on. Relying on your devocion to Irish nationality, we propose to carry on the struggle until the principles for which he lived and died triumph and the national unity is restored.
