THE SUNDAY LAW. The Lord's Day Alliance After the

Police Force.

The following memorial from the cord's Day Alliance has been forward-

Sir,—The undersigned members of the St. John Lord's Day Alliance would respectfully draw the attention of the board of safety to the fact that the legal restrictions upon the sale of intoxicating liquors, beers, groceries, etc., on Sunday, are persistently and openly violated, and that the police force of the city apparently make no attempt to enforce the law. Repeated interviews of a committee of the alliance with the chief of police have been followed by no practical result. Your memorialists therefore respectfully request (1) That the board of safety permit them to appear personally in support of this memorial; and (2) That the board make a full and searching inquiry so as to ascertain if possible, why the police force is so remiss in its duty.

The alliance has also sent a memorial to Premier Tweedle, charging that the chief of police, who is appointed by the provincial government, is not fully the provincial government, is not fully doing his duty in the enforcement of

this law. They ask to be given a hearing before the government.
