RUSSIA'S GREAT DANGER.
The Bear has not yet recovered from
the shock of surprise received when
Japan knocked the chip off his shoulder
and without any waste of words
started in to fight. Not that he did
not expect war. He wanted an easy
free port on the Pacific; he wanted
Korea; he wanted eventually China
and anything else that was handy; he
was willing to fight for them if he
could get them no other way, but he
did not expect to have to fight just
now. The traditions of the diplomatic
ring call for more prying, more
swagger, before the actual mauling
begins, and Adam Zed had confidently
planned on delaying the trouble, by
his usual tactics, until he was in a po-
sition to begin the conflict by a crisp
punching blow himself. Therefore Japan's
discomfited neglect of the niceties of
the game cruelly disappointed him.

The remarkable unpreparedness of
Russia, as disclosed by the first en-
gagements is further explained by the
existence of a strong peace party in
St. Petersburg embracing the Czar
himself and such men as Ex-Minister
of Finance Witte. Though the dis-
ingo party, headed by Alexieff and the
bigot Pobedonostseff, has been enough
in the ascendancy to prevent the grant-
ing of any concessions to Japan, the
other side has to the last held such
influence that, until the outbreak of
hostilities, the mass of the people did
not believe that war was immediately
possible.

For Russia has more to lose by this
war than the control of the Far East.
Russia's greatest danger is internal
and every day the war lasts renders
more difficult the averting of a popu-
lar rebellion which may dwarf the
French revolution.
Dr. Albert Shaw, the editor of the
Review of Reviews, thus concisely
sums up the situation: "With the
Prussians smarting under recent outrages
and taking no pains to conceal the
fact that they are planning a revolu-
tion; the Poles only waiting the mo-
ment to revenge themselves for centuries
of oppression; Siberia crying out
for autonomy; a revolt already brok-
ing out in the Caucasus; the Jews
spreading an insurrectionary propa-
ganda of undying hatred, the finances
disordered; every university a centre
of revolution; millions of ignorant
peasants facing almost constant fam-
ine because of the inadequacy of the
empire's economic policy; with the
Balkans already aflame, and scarcely
a friend among the nations of the
world, what can Russia hope to
gain by a mere war of conquest against
a united people with a superior
navy, financial stability, three times
as many children in the elementary
schools, and the sympathy of the civ-
ilized world, which believes that the
Land of the Rising Sun is fighting to
uphold territorial and commercial in-
tegrity, not only for itself, but for
the whole world?"

The Telegraph the other day pub-
lished what purported to be the letter
of a correspondent who professed to
consider that paper the "leading pub-
lication of its kind in the Maritime
Provinces." The Star hinted that in
the absence of any intimation of the
correspondent's opinion regarding the
kind of publication one must remain in
doubt as to whether the letter was in-
tended as a compliment or otherwise.
The Telegraph this morning explains
that the kind of publication referred
to was a newspaper. It is natural and
reasonable that the Telegraph should
take this charitable view, but in order
to fully remove doubts that may linger
in the minds of those who read the let-
ter referred to, the editor should write
another letter from the same corre-
spondent explaining the true signifi-
cance of the first.

Through the session of the New
Brunswick legislature which opened to-
day St. John will be partially dis-
franchised and will be represented by
only one man in the cabinet. The
reason of course is the certainty of de-
feat for any candidates the government
may put up, though what they have to
gain by delay is hard to see. The
treatment which Mr. McKeown, the
only man with ability on the ticket
who Mr. Blair elected a year ago,
received at the hands of the electorate
of St. John last month, is a fair index
of what awaits any man who comes
here at any time with the taint of the
Tweedle-Pugsey unsavoury combination
upon him.

The speech from the throne today
forecasts some changes in the Provin-
cial Lunatic Asylum. One greatly
needed change that might be sug-
gested is the increasing of the number
of inmates by a few of those in the
employ of this city who are eminently
fitted for residence there.

It is noticeable that there is no men-
tion of a secret ballot law in the
speech from the throne at the opening
of the N. B. legislature today.

AFTER LONG CHASE.
Pursues Fleeing Negro Three Blocks
With Big Crowd Behind Her.

GIRL BEATS THIEF
NEW YORK, March 2.—Leading a
crowd of half a hundred persons, who
were attracted by her cry of "stop
thief," Miss Rosa McCarran, of No. 369
Eighth avenue, chased a negro three
blocks yesterday afternoon. When the
man tried to escape by diving into an
open doorway in West Twenty-seventh
street, she grasped the tail of his over-
coat and held him until two policemen
took the prisoner off her hands.

As Miss McCarran, who is a pretty
young woman, was about to enter the
street door of her home, the negro,
Samuel Richardson, No. 28 West
Lane, came out. Within a month, the
house of Miss McCarran's parents was
robbed and when she saw the man with
a satchel and his pocket bulging, her
first thought was burglary.

"Where are you going?" she deman-
ded.
"I did not answer, but started to
run. The McCarran home is near
Twenty-ninth street and he ran south.
The young woman did not hesitate,
but started in pursuit. As she sped
along she cried a warning, and soon a
crowd was following. The negro ran
to Twenty-seventh street and started
east, and he could not shake off the
girl.

Through the long block between Sev-
enth and Eighth avenues they ran, and
the girl gradually gained on the negro,
who could not keep up the pace. After
crossing Second street, she darted into
a doorway and tried to slam the door
behind him, but his overcoat was
caught, and he could not shake off the
girl.

Before he could free himself Miss
McCarran was at the door and grasped
the coat. Policemen O'Donnell and
Connelly had joined in the chase, and
they reached her before the negro could
haunted, but after Cole was in the
policemen's hands she walked home
amid the cheers of the crowd that had
followed.

TALK OF PAYING BY CHECK.
There has been some talk of chang-
ing the present system of paying on
the I. C. R. and to pay in future by
check. The feasibility of this mode
of payment has been inquired into to
some extent by the management and
it is found that considerable more
work will be entailed, to say nothing
of the inconvenience to employees who
will find it necessary to go to the bank
to have the cheque cashed. It is for
among railway men that while the
cheque system might have its advan-
tages in central localities such as
Moncton, yet it could not be worked
along the road. It is probable, there-
fore, that the present system may be
adhered to. The question of the meth-
od, however, is not interesting the
applicant for the position—Moncton
Times.

WHAT EATMAN DID
Hasen Campbell has just returned
from a trip to England, where he has
been looking after Eatman, the colored
printer. Mr. Campbell told the Sun
yesterday that as regards sport out
here "We don't know we're born yet."
Eatman did not have the best of luck,
for the changes from the cold winters
of Canada to the damp and fog that
they call winter in England, seriously
affected his health. His first ap-
pearance was on Christmas Day at New-
castle in a 2100 handicap. This was
perhaps the most important English
fixture now that the once world fam-
ous Sheffield handicap has become ex-
tinct.

Eatman's performance in getting a
second when in indifferent health was
highly creditable, for as a rule there
are from 150 to 200 competitors. The
distance is 124 yards. Eatman was in
the 11-12 yards mark, and the limit
was 11-13 yards. Keen, whom Eatman
found himself virtual scratch. Easily
winning his heat he could get no near-
er than second in the final.

In a 212 handicap at Glasgow, how-
ever, he scored his first victory.
Eatman was rapidly getting into
form again when Mr. Campbell left
and being trained by Jack Mutton of
Darlington, who has trained more than
one big handicap winner.
Hasen Campbell has brought back
with him from Newcastle Billy Reid,
who has already acquired a reputation
of being a handy fighter in the old
country. A few weeks ago he fought
10 rounds with Jack Palmer, the ver-
dict being a draw. So far he holds an
unbeaten certificate.

Reid is a middleweight, twenty-one
years old, and scales at 155 pounds. He
is willing to fight any man in Canada
at that weight.
POCKETS NOW IN WOMEN'S
STOCKINGS.
New Idea in Hosiery Under Guise of
St. Louis Fair Souvenirs.

Are hosiery pockets for women to
supplant the dainty purse or reticule?
Hosiery who have made a long study
of women's needs for pockets have in-
vented under the guise of St. Louis
Fair souvenirs a big variety of women's
stockings with pockets knitted near the
top.

As a rule the pockets are done in
bright colored silk, the designs being
the Stars and Stripes, crossed flags or
St. Louis Fair inscriptions on pink or
red silk. The pockets are three and
one-half inches in length and one and
three-quarter inches broad, and are
made extensively for the safeguarding
of railroad tickets.

Hosiery manufacturers, who are ac-
customed to study the needs of women
in wearing apparel, eye prophesy
that skirts will be made eventually
with apertures so as to render the
pockets easy of access.
The importers admit that neither
