ARMISTICE SIGNED; WAR ENDED. Linevitch and Oyama Sheathe their Swords. Japanese and Russian Envoys Debated for Nine Hours Before coming to an Agreement Last Night.

GUNSHU PASS, Manchuria, Sept. 15.—Owing to the variance between Russian and Japanese views and the fact that the exact spot of the meeting of the Russian and Japanese representatives had not been defined, Major Gen. FROST LAST NIGHT DID GREAT DAMAGE. Was Very Severe Throughout the Province. Six Degrees of Frost at Moncton—Crops There and at Sussex Suffered Considerably.

The frost which was predicted for the province arrived duly on time last evening. There has not been a month this year without a frost, but last night's cold was the heaviest since the spring.

GREAT DAMAGE AT SUSSEX. (Special to the Star.) SUSSEX, N. B., Sept. 15.—A very heavy frost last night did much damage to the crops of the farmers in this vicinity, and completely destroyed the gardens in the town.
