##### INTER-SOCIETY LEAGUE

The largest and most enthusiastic crowd of spectators that has witnessed a game of ball on the Victoria grounds saw a double header on Saturday afternoon, and they certainly received the worth of their money.

There were about 800 people present, and the two full nine inning games were quickly played. The first game was between the St. Joseph's and F. M. A. team, and the second between the St. Peter's and St. Joseph's teams, and a singular thing was that the score in both games was the same, 10 to 3. The St. Joseph's outplayed the F. M. A. team and the St. Peter's took the lead in the league by defeating the St. Peter's. It only took an hour and 17 minutes for the first game to be played, and an hour and a half for the second game. The double umpire system was used, and Pete McAllister and John Malcolm were the men to decide the points.
