THREE DEAD, ONE THOUSAND HURT IN TRACTION STRIKE

Another Boy Shot Today by a Policeman for Stoning a Car-General Strike Has Not Been Called

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 23 — Three dead, three lying at the point of death in hospitals, and more than a thousand persons injured, is the toll exacted by the reign of lawlessness which has existed in this city for three days, and which may be renewed today as the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company expects to have more cars in oleration than on any day since the strike started.
